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ABOUT THIS BOOKLET

This booklet presents the results from its survey "An Understanding of Romantic Relationships for young people in Co. Monaghan". The survey, designed through Survey Monkey, was completed by over 500 young people from Co. Monaghan. Developed by Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg, this summary of results is one that aims to share its survey findings in a concise and easy-to-read format.

For young people building positive and romantic relationships is an fundamental component of growing up. All children grow and thrive in the context of close and dependable relationships that provide love and nurturance, security, and both responsive and health interactions. A positive relationship built on trust, understanding, and caring will foster young people's cooperation and motivation and increase their positive outcomes in all aspects of their lives. In order to support young people in this area, this survey sought to understand more about the challenges and issues young people face in relation to relationships, consent and their understanding of it, who they want to learn about relationships from and the way they would like to receive information.

This booklet sets out the main points raised by young people in the survey. It also includes the recommendations being put forward by Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg and a list of helpful resources. We hope that it will be a useful and relatable source of information for young people, parents and youth practitioners which will support broader discussions on this topic.



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INTRODUCTION

Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg is a youth council, which gives children and young people the opportunity to be involved in the development of local services and policies. The core methodology of this social action based youth participation model centres on young people identifying, prioritising and working to progress topics which they identify as being important to them. Our members then try to influence local decision-makers to achieve their desired outcome, impact or change. The members of the committee are elected through their Secondary Schools and Youth Organisations and sit for a 2-year term of office on the committee.

Comhairle na nóg gets young people's voices heard in two ways: working on young people's topics; and acting as a consultative forum.

Key Topic 2019

Each year the Comhairle works on a "Key Topic" to prioritise their workload on.

This year "Relationships" was selected as the key topic.

This topic was selected through the following steps:



Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg are required to hold a yearly Annual General Meeting. Up to 100 young people attended the event in 2018 and at it they got the opportunity to suggest topics for the Comhairle to work on for the coming year. This was done through large blank sheets displayed throughout the venue. Topics such as Mental Health, Irish Language, Relationships and Climate change were some of the topics that were suggested by a large amount of young people.



These suggestions were then brought back to a Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg meeting. At the meeting, Comhairle members discussed the different topics suggested and possible ideas for each topic.



To ensure that all members of the Comhairle had a say in the key topic for the year, a poll was created on the Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg closed facebook page with the topics suggested at the AGM and spoken about at the meeting. The topic selected by the majority of people was "Promoting Positive Relationships".

The Comhairle are also required to hold quarterly steering group meetings with members of other organisations, which are linked with the key topic for the year. At the first quarterly meeting various ideas were suggested around what the Comhairle could do for their key topic this year. One of the ideas suggested and discussed in depth was the idea of developing a survey around the relationships young people in Co. Monaghan experience, the Comhairle members in attendance at the meeting offered valuable insight into this idea and how they felt it would work best. This idea was brought to the Comhairle members at their next meeting. The members of the Comhairle agreed that this would be a good piece of work. They also brainstormed other ideas to promote positive relationships and came up with the following:

- A poster campaign
- Short videos
- A survey on relationships.
- A chalk/art piece in the main towns or secondary schools in Monaghan with the results of the survey
- Presenting the findings to County Council or possibly to a TD/Minister.

DEVELOPING A SURVEY

Due to the sensitive topics and questions that would be asked in relation to relationships it was suggested that the coordinators of Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg meet with a staff member from the ISPCC to discuss what questions could be included and how more personal questions could be phrased. This was all took on board when developing the survey.

The Comhairle discussed:

1. Target age group:

Comhairle members felt that the survey should be open to all young people from the age of twelve up. The decision was also made to allow over eighteens to complete the survey and have no age limit to see how the views of young people differ from adults.

2. The questions that would be asked:

The facilitators of the Comhairle developed a draft survey based on the feedback from the ISPCC. This draft was brought forward to members of Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg who made adjustments such as changing questions, changing the wording and essentially ensuring that the survey was youth friendly and got enough information to make it a worthwhile piece of work. The survey consisted of open and closed questions, multiple choice questions and rating scales.

3. How the survey would be distributed:

The Comhairle discussed what would be the best approach to get young people to answer the survey and to answer it honestly. Comhairle members felt the best way for young people to answer it would be through their phones. They could gain access to the survey through links on social media platforms like Facebook, Whatsapp and Snapchat. Comhairle members felt that if young people were asked to answer the survey in large groups they would be less inclined to answer it honestly.

RAISING AWARENESS AND COLLECTING FINDINGS:

The survey went live on the website "Survey Monkey" at the beginning of May 2019, with the aim of being open for a month. Comhairle members, Youth organisations and other local services all shared the link to the survey across their social media platform with great success early on, large number completing the survey.

The facilitators of the survey could keep up to date with the number of people completing the survey and also the gender and age breakdown. Early indications indicated that more females were doing the survey and surprisingly large amounts of 18s were doing it. To try and balance this out a number of Comhairle members approached their school principal and asked would it be possible for them to set up a stand at lunch time in their school and get younger people to complete the survey. This was done in the Patrician High School Carrickmacross, Our Lady's Secondary School Castleblayney and in Beech Hill College Monaghan town.


Youth Work Ireland Cavan Monaghan was also hosting a cross boarder mental health conference in Monaghan town while the survey was open. Staff members of the organisation went around the crowd who attended the event and got young people to complete the survey on tablets provided. One of the schools who attended the event was St. Macartans Secondary School from Monaghan Town. This is an all-boys school which helped with increasing the numbers of young males who completed the survey.

Throughout the month of May, the survey was continuously promoted on social media accounts.

FINDINGS OF THE SURVEY

The survey was completed by 542 people with the gender, age and sexual identity being as follows:

1. Basic Information



Straight: 499 (92.07%), Gay: 6 (1.11%), Lesbian: 8 (1.48%), Bisexual: 28 (5.17%), Homosexual 1 (0.18%)

Breaking this question down further and more specifically by age the results are as follows: 16/17-year-old: 90.77% identified as 'Straight', 14/15-year-old: 87.80% identified as straight, 12/13-year-old: 95.37% identified as being straight.

2. Relationships and You

Participants who identified as other selected the options I have been in one but I'm not anymore and I'm in right now.

What is the longest relationship you have been?

Answers to this question were very varied right across the board ranging from a few week's right up to 19 years (Over 18). The younger the age, the less likely to have a longer relationship. As the age categories went up, the length of relationships also increased.

- What age do you think is an acceptable age to get into a relationship with a partner? Similar to the question above the answer to this question varied depending on the age range. Young people on the 12-13 age category roughly said an age between 12-15 years old with some young people commenting "depends on the person" and you can start a relationship "if you are mature to keep it". Young people in the category 14-15 picked their own age 14/15 as an acceptable age to get into a relationship, a very low amount said anything below 14 or above 16. The older category of 16/17 were similar to the age below them and said ages, on average, 15 above. Some of the comments included "Any time after 15-16 and knows about RSE" and "Anytime as long as both parties aren't pressured into it". The over 18 range averaged on the ages 16/17 with comments including "depends on the people", "Sexual relationship -16(minimum), Romantic relationships 14/15", "When you're ready" and "18+, enjoy life".
- Please select the top five characteristics of a healthy/unhealthy relationship to you. The top characteristics of a healthy relationship from boys Males of all age ranges (12-18+) were respect with trust coming second, other answers included loyalty, caring, communication and equality. Girls Females from all age ranges (12-18) said respect was their top characteristics. Females also said answers like get on well together, caring, fun, teamwork and time for each other. The other category selected answers such as respect, loyalty and honesty. Jealousy and violence topped the characteristics for the unhealthy relationships form the both males and females boys and girls of all age ranges (12-18+). The youngest boys males (12/13) also said alcohol/drug abuse. The words "only sexual" and "Too sexual" etc. appeared frequently in the female categories (14-17). The words selected by others were similar to that of females, with violence being mentioned.

If you break the two into a male/female overall divide there is a clear indication that females either recognises or experience an unhealthy relationship more so than males with female's breakdown at 17.22% (Unhealthy relationship) and male's breakdown at 5.66%.

OTHER:

Those who recognise as being 'other' broke down as 66.67% mostly healthy, 33.33% mostly unhealthy.

If you break the two into a male/female overall divide there is a clear indication that females either recnognises or experience an unhealthy relationship more so than males with female's breakdown at 17.22% (Unhealthy relationship) and male's breakdown at 5.66%. Those who recnognise as being 'other' broke down as 66.67% mostly healthy, 33.33% mostly unhealthy.

The 'Other' all said that they would be able to spot the signs of an unhealthy relationship.

Those who completed the survey were also asked to comment on the signs they would recognise. The younger female categories (12-15) mainly said words that related to signs of their friend being unhappy, not themselves or depressed. The older category (16+) more commonly mentioned controlling partners, signs of violence, low self-esteem and not seeing them as often. The younger male category (12-15) was similar to the females of this age in saying if they appeared unhappy, however they also mentioned controlling more than the females did. The older males (16+) mentioned their friend not being themselves or appearing to be feeling down. The older male category, unlike females of the same age did not mention the words violence or signs of violence.

Survey participants were also asked if they answered yes could they share what it is that made you feel uncomfortable (If you feel comfortable to do so).

In the male 12/13 category responses included "Online Bullying" and "saying something that wasn't nice". Male 14/15 category "send nudes", "I have been asked to talk about a best friend behind their back" and "break up with my friend's girlfriend for him". Male 16/17 "nudes", "Pretend I was someone else" and "I have had to lie and I have send some messages that I knew would upset the other person so I couldn't bring myself to do it to their face". Finally, Male 18+ "send nudes", "tease and slag someone" and "post on a page". Female category 12/13 "send nudes", "to drink" and "get with someone". 14/15 category "send nudes" and "send pornographic images". 16/17 category "manipulated into sending pictures" and "send inappropriate images". Female category over 18 "When I was 14 I was asked to send nudes", "felt pressured into sending sexually explicit messages" and "asked questions that were invading privacy".

A survey participant who identified as Other, said "Send Nudes, (Major regrets)".

Survey participants were asked, if yes to explain their answer. Comments included: "To dress slutty" (female 16/17), "To drink alcohol" (female 12/13) and "you get judged if you don't do stuff".

The Males responses were as follows, "To get with someone you don't like" (Male 14/15) and "Yes because you need something expensive to wear" (Male 12/13). "Drinking alcohol" appeared very frequently right across all age categories and gender.

Monaghan Comhairle na nÓg believe that the survey findings show that there is a clear need for young people in Co. Monaghan to receive more education around the topic of relationships.

Findings that stood out to members include the following:



Have you ever been asked to send a "nude" picture through social media?

The findings show that younger females, 12/13 year olds 37.50% and 14/15 years old 60.61%, were far more likely than their male counterparts, 12/13 years old 6.65% and 14/15 year olds 21.88%, to be asked to send a nude picture. The gap does close the older the young people get, males 16/17 years old 64% and females of the same age 79.71%.



Sexual Identity

Comhairle members felt that 92.07% identifying as 'Straight' was higher than they would have estimated.



Do you feel pressured to dress or act in a certain way at a teenage disco?

(e.g.: "Get with someone", drink alcohol, wear revealing clothing? Females in the younger age category, 45% yes, felt pressured to act or dress in a certain way at discos, however the boys/males of the same age worked out at 25%. The older the young people got the amounts facing pressure to act or behave a certain way increased significantly for males and females, 16/17-year-old male group 52% and females of the same age 62%.

Large numbers of young people mentioned the pressure to drink alcohol or dress a certain way.



If you have ever been in relationship was it mostly healthy or mostly unhealthy?

Females in all age ranges were more likely to have experienced a negative relationship than their male counterparts. In the younger ages, females 14/15 year olds 20% had experienced a negative relationship, males of the same age were only 3.28%.

MONAGHAN COMHAIRE NA NÓG RECOMMENDATIONS

Monaghan Comhairle have the following recommendations based on the findings of the survey:

1. Relationship programme for First and Second Year students

Comhairle members felt that there is a need for young people in first and second year to receive more information on relationships through a structured programme over a period of time, opposed to one of events.

Comhairle members felt that the programme would cover the same issues in both years but the issues would be more advanced, "heavier", in second year as the students became more mature.

In first year Comhairle members recommend that young people cover topics such as:

- Peer pressure e.g. pressure to kiss someone before a certain age, clothing for disco
- Using social media correctly and safely e.g. not giving people your password or sharing too much information.
- A basic understanding of consent
- Characteristics of healthy and unhealthy relationships
- Friendships (Doesn't always have to be about boyfriends and girlfriend)
- LGBT+ Relationship information

In Second year Comhairle members recommend that young people cover topics such as:

- Peer Pressure e.g pressure to become more sexually active.
- Using Social Media correctly and safely e.g. consequences of sending nudes and sexting
- Consent- Sexual consent and how to clearly give consent.
- Sex talk Safe sex.

Comhairle members felt that a programme would work best if it was delivered by Youth Workers, similar to another programme delivered in schools in Co. Monaghan "Don't Pour Your Dreams Away". They also believed that young people would be more inclined to speak about such topics if their teacher was not present, but Comhairle members understood that this is not always possible.

Comhairle members believe that the programme would be best delivered in small mixed groups, male/females/others, as it would be a good way for the opposite sex to listen to each other's viewpoints. They also stressed that young people would be more willing to engage in conversations if the programme was run towards the end of the first year as students will be more comfortable with their peers by this stage in the year, opposed to the beginning of first year.

2. Consent talk education for students in TY/LCA

Comhairle members recommend that consent talks for young people in TY/LCA, 15-17 year olds, would be beneficial as a follow up to the 1st/2nd year Relationship Programme suggested above. Large numbers of Comhairle members between the ages of 15-17 year olds have yet to receive information or talk on consent in their schools.
