### Taoiseach Micheál Martin visits Monaghan County Museum

On 5 November 2021, An Taoiseach Micheál Martin was welcomed to the "Experiences of Border Minority Communities – Historical Perspectives" hosted by Monaghan County Museum. The conference which took place as part of the State's Decade of Centenaries Programme featured lectures by keynote speakers including historians Dr Daniel Purcell and Dr Margaret O'Callaghan who delivered historical assessments of partition. The following panel discussion was moderated by Dr Éamon Phoenix.

### **Peace Campus Updates**

Anyone driving across the North Road or down Glaslough Street in Monaghan couldn't fail to notice the advances in the construction on the site of the new Monaghan Peace Campus. It is exciting to see what has been, until recently, a vision on paper or a computer screen emerging in the Monaghan landscape. Here at the museum, preparations for the big move have been ongoing but our excitement has gone up another level as our new home emerges from behind the hoarding, Despite Covid-19 necessitating closure of the site from 8 January 2021 - 4 May 2021 great progress has been made with construction. As well as becoming the new home for the museum, the Peace Campus will also house the library, a youth facility, a shared community multi-use space both inside and out and underground parking. This sensational addition to Monaghan town has been supported by the EU's PEACE IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB)

### Preparation for the Big Move

### **Condition Audit**

As part of the preparations for the big move to the museum's new home in the Peace Campus in early 2023, a condition audit of the collection has been undertaken. This has meant going through objects in storage, shelf by shelf and box by box.

Condition audits involve examining each object and detailing the condition, stability and whether future treatments are required. Museums use condition audits as part of conservation planning and are incredibly useful as they provide information about the condition and stability of the objects which helps museum staff prioritise actions such as preparing objects for display and making improvements in storage conditions where necessary.

Condition audits provide an overview of the health of the collection and allows museum staff to ensure standards are being met as part of our continued commitment to collections care as part of our Accreditation to the Museum Standards Programme for Ireland.


After objects have been checked for the audit and photographed, they are being safely repacked, ready for the move to the new Peace Campus building when the museum relocates.

### The Clones Affray: Death of Matt Fitzpatrick

The 11 February 2022 marked the centenary of the death of Matt Fitzpatrick in an event that has become known as The Clones Affray. To acknowledge this anniversary, the museum launched a new exhibit on the incident that

occurred at Clones Railway Station just one month after the transfer of power from the British to the Provisional Government of the new Irish Free State.

Matt Fitzpatrick's involvement in the War of Independence in County Monaghan is well documented in our nationally acclaimed exhibition Monaghan's War of Independence 1919-1921. In February 1920 Matt is believed to have taken part in the raid on Ballytrain RIC Barracks, and in 1921 he played a role in the IRA raid on Roslea where he was wounded and captured. The subsequent rescue of him from the heavily guarded Monaghan Infirmary has become known as 'the epic of the War of Independence in County Monaghan'.

Despite surviving his injuries and epic rescue, Matt's life was cut short during the Clones Affray. On 11 February 1922 Matt was alerted by members of his IRA battalion to the presence of armed Ulster Special Constabulary (USC) on a train stopped in Clones. In the ensuing battle of gunfire Matt Fitzpatrick was shot and killed and four members of USC also lay dead. The aftermath of the Clones Affray led to outrage in Northern Ireland, igniting violent sectarian attacks and prompting calls from Winston Churchill for an investigative tribunal.

The new display on the Clones Affray has drawn attention to this sometimes-forgotten flashpoint in the early history of the Irish State and has itself garnered national coverage. The exhibit includes the rifle that reportedly killed Matt Fitzpatrick, as well as his Mauser handgun and a wooden crucifix display including the small metal crucifix he had in his pocket when he died. The museum is very grateful to Matt's nephew Mr Gerard Fitzpatrick for his assistance and loans of objects for this exhibit.

## What's the Story? The Buzz about the Blue Bottle!

Objects in the museum all have their unique story to tell, and recently an old Guinness bottle in our collection aroused our interest. It was blue, making it stand out from the hoard of more familiar brown stout bottles.

On close inspection it became clear that while the stout that originally filled this bottle started life at the Guinness Brewery, St. James's Gate, Dublin, but the bottle certainly didn't. The label shows this beer had been bottled locally in Scotstown, County Monaghan.




Research reveals that Guinness did not start bottling its own product until the 1950s. Until then, Guinness sold stout in casks only. The stout left the brewery at St. James's Gate in wooden casks and was subsequently bottled by individual publicans, hoteliers and wholesalers. Each of these individual bottlers were responsible for sourcing their own bottles and corks - accounting for our blue Guinness bottle!

Bottling was achieved using a syphon bottle-filler that drew the Guinness from a trough into a series of syphons that fed the beer into connected empty bottles. Publicans could sign up to use an official personalised Guinness trademark label showing their name and address and provided by the brewery, but in turn had to agree not to sell any other brown beer. Those who didn't enter this agreement could produce their own, known in the trade as 'white labels', but these had to be approved by the Guinness brewery.

Following the decision of Guinness to begin bottling their own product in the 1950s the practice of individual publicans in Ireland bottling declined and died out completely in the early 1970s. This tradition may be gone but has left a trove of unique bottles with labels that tell their own story.

### Minecraft World of Rossmore Update



The actual Rossmore Castle, sited just outside Monaghan town, had fallen into disrepair during the mid-twentieth century and was eventually demolished during the 1970s. This recreation of the building through the Microsoft Minecraft game by Monaghan County Museum and their partners Amma Creative Learning Centre in Armagh has allowed access to this magnificent building and surroundings again.
