




Scéim Bóthair N2 Baile na Lorgan / Cluain Tiobraid

The 16km N2 Road Realignment Scheme runs north-south through the drumlin topography in County Monaghan.

Named after the ancient barony of Críoch Mhughdhorn, the Cremorne Way is a major infrastructural improvement to the National road network in County Monaghan. The original Scheme was designed as a single carriageway road and in 2004 was upgraded to a pilot 2+1 road type and progressed as a Design and Build Contract.

Tendering for the Scheme began in October 2004, and the Contract was awarded to GAMA-TUBIN CONSTRUCTION Ltd. in September 2005. The designers for the Scheme were Arup Consulting Engineers, Dublin. Works commenced on site in November 2005. The drumlin topography presented many engineering challenges, including soft ground and bogs, major sections of cut and over 1.2 million cubic metres of fill material. It took 24 months to deliver the new N2 mainline.

Monaghan County Council would like to ackowledge the support of the EU, the National Roads Authority, Department of Transport, Atkins Consulting Engineers, the contractor Gama-Tubin Construction Ltd. and their designers Arup Consulting Engineers. Their co-operation and assistance resulted in the timely delivery of this Scheme.



What is a 2+1 Road

CLONTIBRET

In 2004, after extensive research into road safety, the National Roads Authority took the decision to pilot a number of 2+1 road schemes around the country. The 2+1 road type caters for traffic volumes on single carriageway roads whilst achieving significant reductions in the frequency and severity of accidents.

The 2+1 road type allows for safe overtaking on alternating sections of between 1 and 2 kilometres. The opposing traffic volumes are separated by a safety barrier which prevents overtaking on the single carriageway sections, eliminating crossover accidents and head-on collisions.

Funding

Identified as an objective of the National Development Plan, the Scheme was funded by the Irish Government under the National Development Plan 2000 - 2006 and part-financed by the European Union.

The total cost of the Scheme represents an investment of €115m in the road infrastructure of County Monaghan.

Significant Milestones

Archaeology and the Environment The area surrounding the Scheme has a rich and varied heritage. The name "Cremorne Way" or "Sli Crioch Mughdhorna" seeks to instil some of the archaeological heritage of the area into the

bypass and to remind all road users that they are travelling through a county steeped in culture

and history. Every effort was made to ensure the Scheme did not impact on the archaeology or

environment of County Monaghan. The site of the battle of Clontibret, fought in 1595 during the Nine Year War, is located close to Clontibret village and was unaffected by the works.

Comprehensive archaeological assessment was initiated by Monaghan County Council prior to construction, ensuring that there was no delay to the construction works. A number of bronze age and medieval artefacts were recovered, including a spindle whorl used in the manufacture of

clothing and a glass bead found in the vicinity of a medieval ring fort. The archaeological

investigations were undertaken by Irish Archaeological Consultancy Ltd.

The findings of environmental assessments were incorporated into the Employers Requirements for the Scheme. Almost 8km of reflective and absorbant noise barriers were used to ensure a

scheme which complies with Irish and European Standards.

The N2 Castleblayney to Clontibret bypass marks another milestone in the continuing development of the national road infrastructure in this country and I am very happy to be associated with its opening.

The N2 National Primary Route is the main arterial route from Dublin to Derry, Donegal and the northwest, and the section from Ardee to north of Emyvale forms part of the Trans-European Road Network.

This scheme is 16km in length and provides a bypass of the town of Castleblayney and the villages of Clontibret and Annayalla. It runs between the townland of Moy Otra at the northern end to the townland of Drumcrew at the southern end of the scheme. The 2+1

road type provides safe two-lane overtaking zones, which alternate with one-lane sections at intervals of approximately 2km. The traffic streams are separated by a safety barrier which prevents overtaking manoeuvres on the single-lane sections. Right turning will only be permitted at designated junctions to reduce the number of conflict areas and to enhance safety. The scheme was a Design and Build type contract.

Finally, I wish to extend my thanks and congratulations to Monaghan County Council, the National Roads Authority, Contractors, Engineers and all others involved in the project.
