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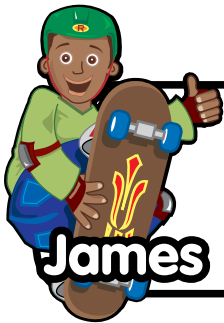

Telling people about road safety and encouraging safer travel.

First things first!

As an official JRSO, your first mission is to introduce yourself in your school assembly! You can also put the **All about me** poster on a school notice board to make sure everyone knows you're a JRSO.

When you've done that, you can start planning talks in assemblies, class or small groups to get the rest of your school involved and help them learn. One talk a month would be a good target to aim for.

So how do you do it? Here are our top tips:

- Decide on a **time** with your school guide or teacher.
- Choose a **topic** to talk about – use your **planner** for ideas for each month, get advice from your school guide or Road Safety Officer, or visit road safety websites.
- Think of ways to get your **audience** involved and to keep their attention. You could ask questions, get others to help you, or make up songs and plays.
- Use assemblies to talk about new **competitions** or announce competition winners and give out certificates and prizes too.
- Remember practice makes perfect, so **practice** what you'll say in front of your friends and family.
- Speak **loudly, clearly and slowly** during your talk, but most of all remember to have fun.

Running Competitions

Holding exciting competitions will get everyone in your school interested in road safety. You can find examples of activities, such as quizzes and word searches, to base your competitions around in the Activities section.

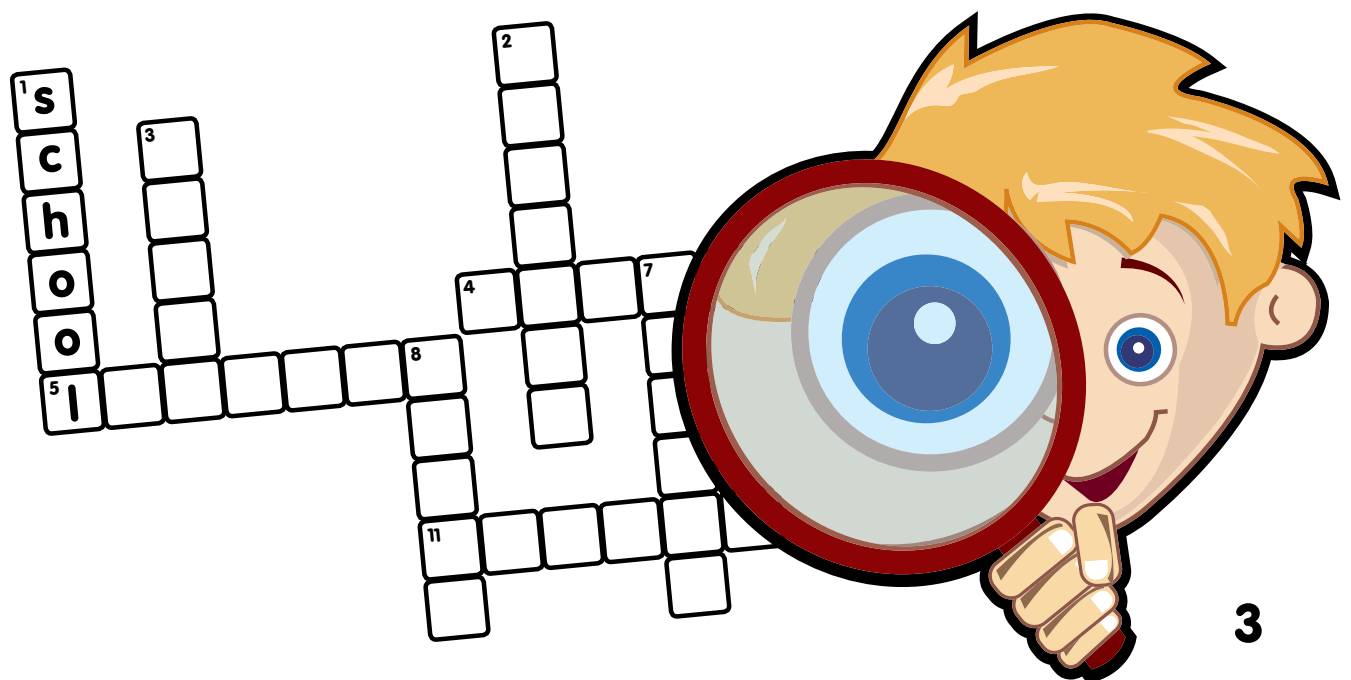
Follow these steps:

- Pick a topic; look at your year planner on page 11 for help or search websites for more information and inspiration on road safety.
- Get help from your teacher to find the best time to run competitions. Think about who the competition is for – just your class, a couple of year groups or the whole school.
- Now decide what type of competition you want to run - see our competition ideas on the next page.
- Tell everyone about the competition and when and where they need to hand their entries in; put up posters, tell people in class or assembly, or use your school website if you have one.
- You can make a collection box (page 4) for people to post their entries in and put it in a place where everyone can see it; make sure you tell everyone to write their name and class on the entries so you know who the winner is.
- Next, ask an adult to be a judge and pick the winners of the competition; this could be your teacher, another teacher, or your Principal. If the competition is for the whole school, they could choose winners from each year group.
- Give out certificates for the best entries - you can photocopy the template on page 12 and write the winners' names, class and what competition they won on the lines; or you could always design your own.
- Why not announce the winners in class or assembly; they could come to the front to collect their certificate or prize; winning entries could be displayed on a notice board or wall for everyone to see.

Competition ideas

There are endless possibilities for the type of road safety competitions you could run. Here are just a few ideas:

- Write a **song, poem or rap** – you could ask people to record or perform it.
- Create a **word search, crossword** or other puzzle.
- Write an **advice leaflet** to show your school and parents how to stay safe.
- Write a **story**.
- Make up and perform a road safety **play or advert** – you could even film it.
- Find a **picture** to remind you to be safe – either take a photo, print one from the web or cut it out of a magazine – just add a caption.
- Make a **poster** with a road safety message.
- Design hi-visibility clothing or other **products** to make you safer.
- Draw a **map** showing where students live and how they travel to school, then highlight the safer routes to your school.
- You can also choose something from the Activities section.

Putting up posters

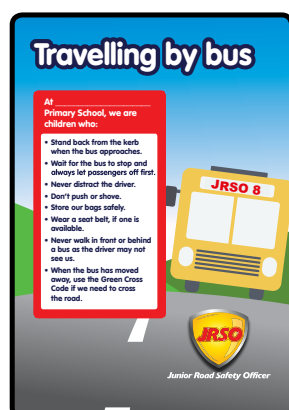

More fun ideas from other JRSOs

This pack has lots of ideas for you to use – but don't just stop there. You can do better than that! Use your imagination to come up with your own ways to keep your school street safe. Here are some ideas from JRSOs.

Model behaviour!

JRSOs made a 150cm model to show children whether or not they needed a car seat. The children measured themselves against the model and, if they were shorter, their parents received a leaflet explaining what sort of car seat was suitable.

JRSO

On course for safety!

JRSOs put together and taught a six-week course for Second and Third class. The course focused on a different topic each week, including the Safe Cross Code and road signs, and finished with a quiz to see how much the children had learnt. The JRSOs' work was so impressive they were invited to their local council's Road Safety Advisory Committee to talk about their achievements!

Computer whizzes!

JRSOs created a road safety website for their school. The colourful site introduced all the JRSOs and included details of the competitions they were running throughout the school, plus photos of winners. Other JRSOs have used their computer skills to create a PowerPoint presentation to use when they give talks, or to produce posters.



The write stuff!

A Primary School started a petition to get a pedestrian crossing installed on a busy road nearby. After getting more than 200 people to sign the petition, the JRSOs presented it to their local council. Other JRSOs have written to local shops to ask if parents can park in their car park and walk the rest of the way, rather than stop outside the school.

Petitions and letters can encourage people, who could help make roads safer, to do something about it. If there's something you'd like to change to make the streets and roads around your school safer, why not talk to your teacher to see what you can do about it?

Parking patrol

JRSOs Emily and Nora, started a patrol outside their school, to stop people from parking on the yellow zig-zag lines. The patrol was so successful they received a congratulatory visit from their local Garda sergeant!

As easy as ABC...

JRSOs created an A-Z book of road safety stories for younger children. The JRSOs got each person in the class to write a story beginning with a different letter of the alphabet, such as **B** for Bicycle, **S** for School Crossing Patrol and **Z** for Zebra Crossing.

Fashionable flickers!

JRSOs raised money through a school fashion show and used the proceeds to make road safety flick books. The children arranged for a cameraman to film them crossing the road safely and then used the images, along with key road safety messages, to create the flick books.

Safety survey


JRSOs produced a questionnaire on road safety and asked both pupils and teachers to complete it. The results influenced the decision to employ a School Crossing Warden.

Clubbing together!


JRSOs ran a road safety club for children in First Class, held during lunch time. The children used computers, games and cookery to reinforce the Safe Cross Code.

Staying street safe

Crossing safely

There are lots of safer places for you to cross the road, such as a:

- **Zebra Crossing - page 15**
- **Pelican Crossing - page 16**
- **Puffin Crossing - page 17**
- **Toucan Crossing - page 18**
- **Footbridge - page 19**
- **Subway - page 20**
- **Traffic Island - page 21**

Always use the **Safe Cross Code** whenever you're crossing the road and remember to keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

You also need to know how to cross at **traffic lights** (page 10) and **between parked cars** (page 11) if you have to, and with the help of **School Crossing Warden** or **Gardaí** (page 12).

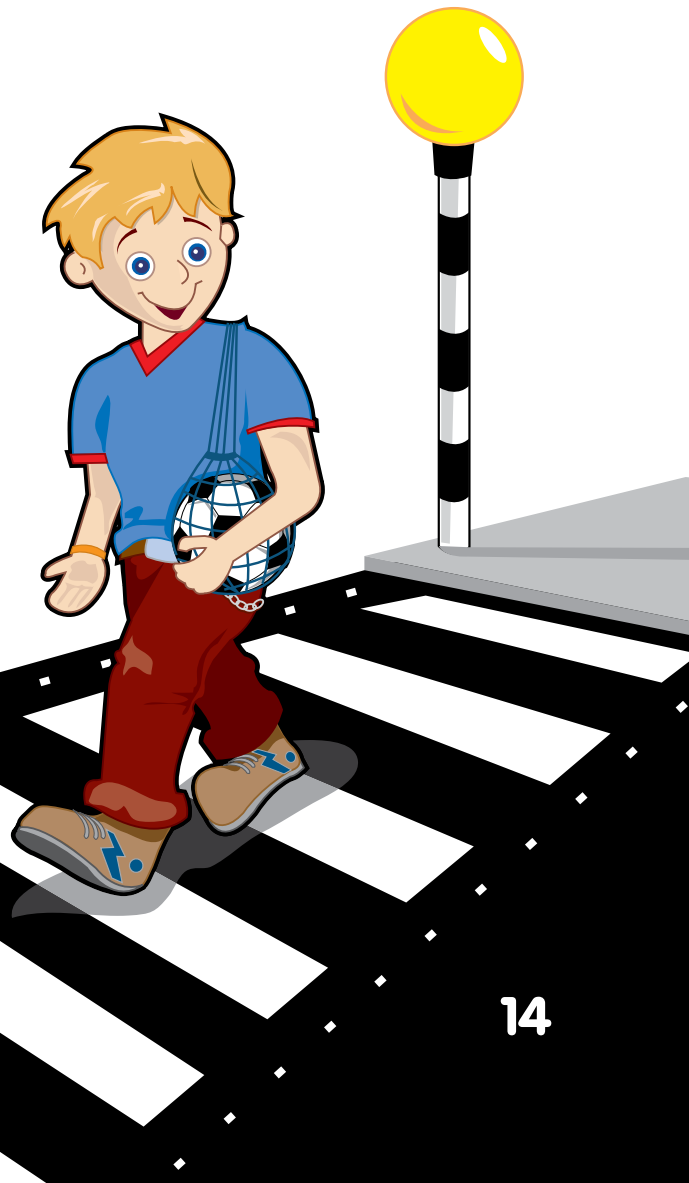
Safe Cross Code

Walking

When walking to school, to your friend's house or anywhere in between, use the footpath where there is one. It's important to follow simple rules before crossing any road. These rules are called the Safe Cross Code.

1. Look for a safe place.
- 2 Don't hurry, stop and wait.
3. Look all around and listen before you cross the road.
4. Let all the traffic pass you.
5. Walk straight across.
6. Keep walking.

That's the Safe Cross Code!

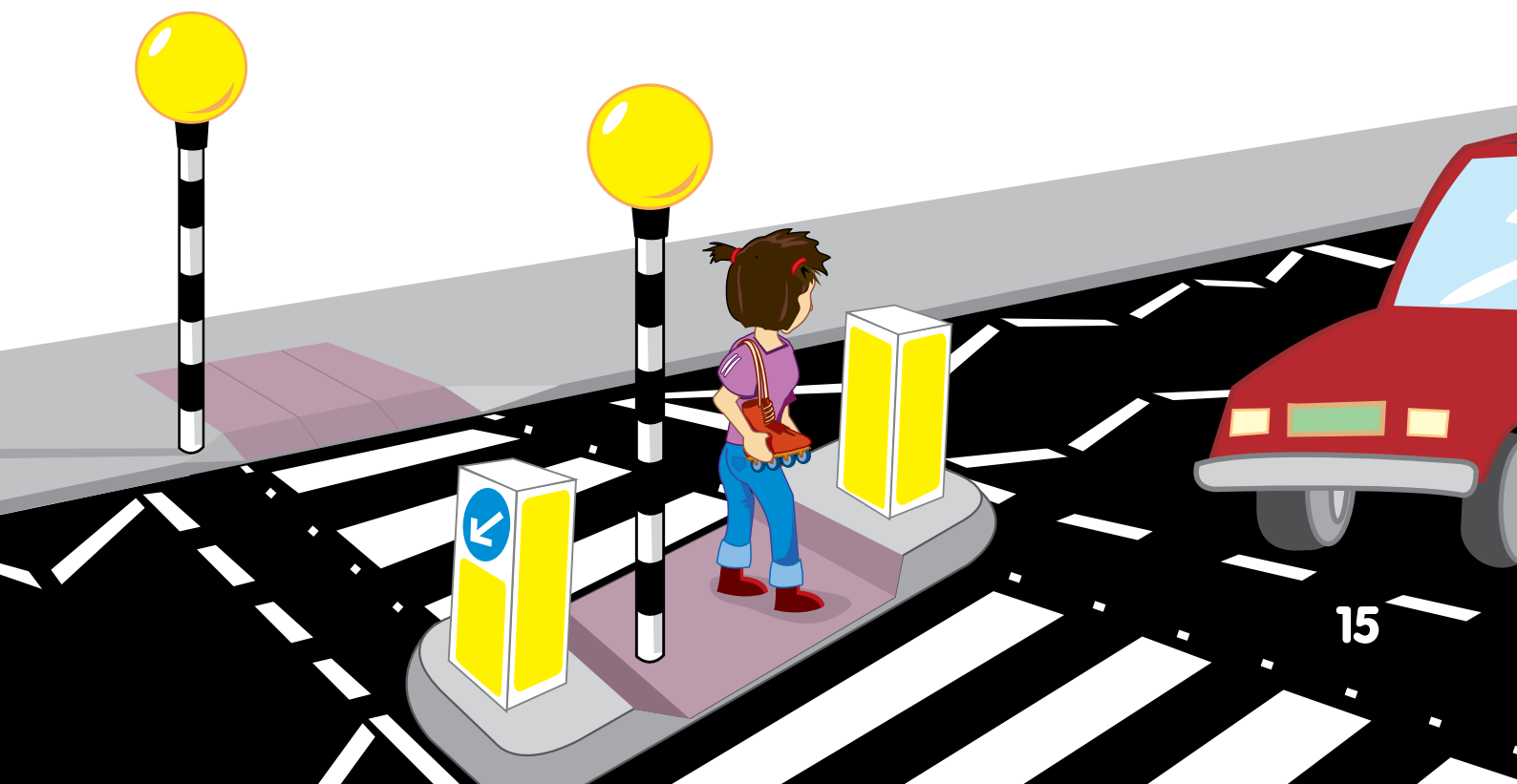


Crossing at Zebra Crossings

- Zebra crossings have black and white stripes, just like a zebra.
- Traffic should stop if drivers see you waiting to cross.
- Wait on the footpath until all the traffic has stopped.
- When it is safe to do so, walk straight across the crossing.
- Make sure you keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

If the zebra crossing has a traffic island in the middle, you must treat this as two crossings.

- First cross to the traffic island using the Safe Cross Code from page 14, then stop.
- Use the Safe Cross Code again to cross the second part of the road. Remember to keep looking and listening for traffic.

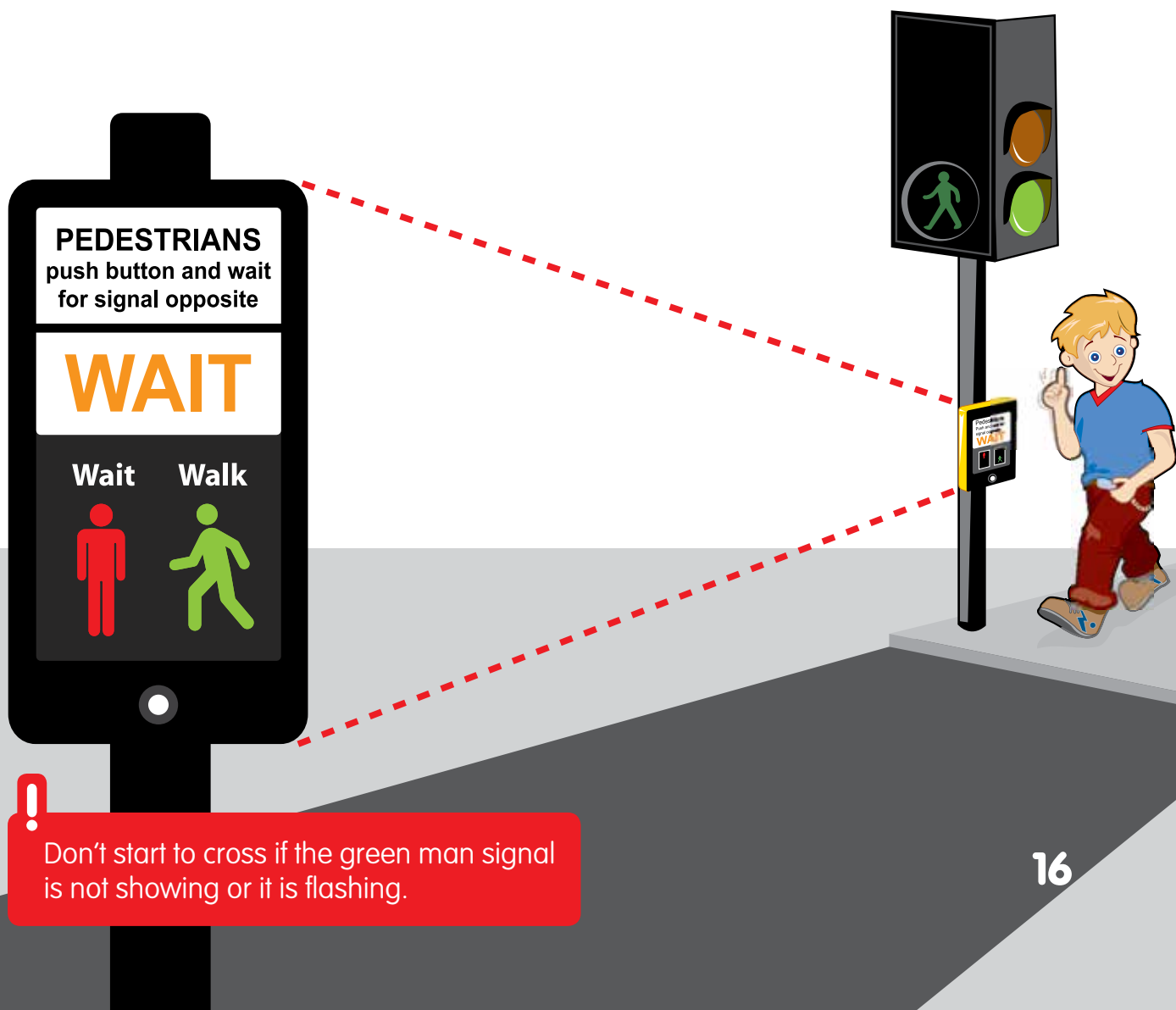


Crossing at Pelican Crossings

- Pelican crossings have a **green man** and **red man** signal and a control box with a button to press.
- When you want to cross, push the button and wait for the **green man** signal on the post on the opposite side of the road, before you cross.

You must push the button to stop the traffic.

- When the traffic has stopped and the **green man** signal is showing, you can start to walk across the road.

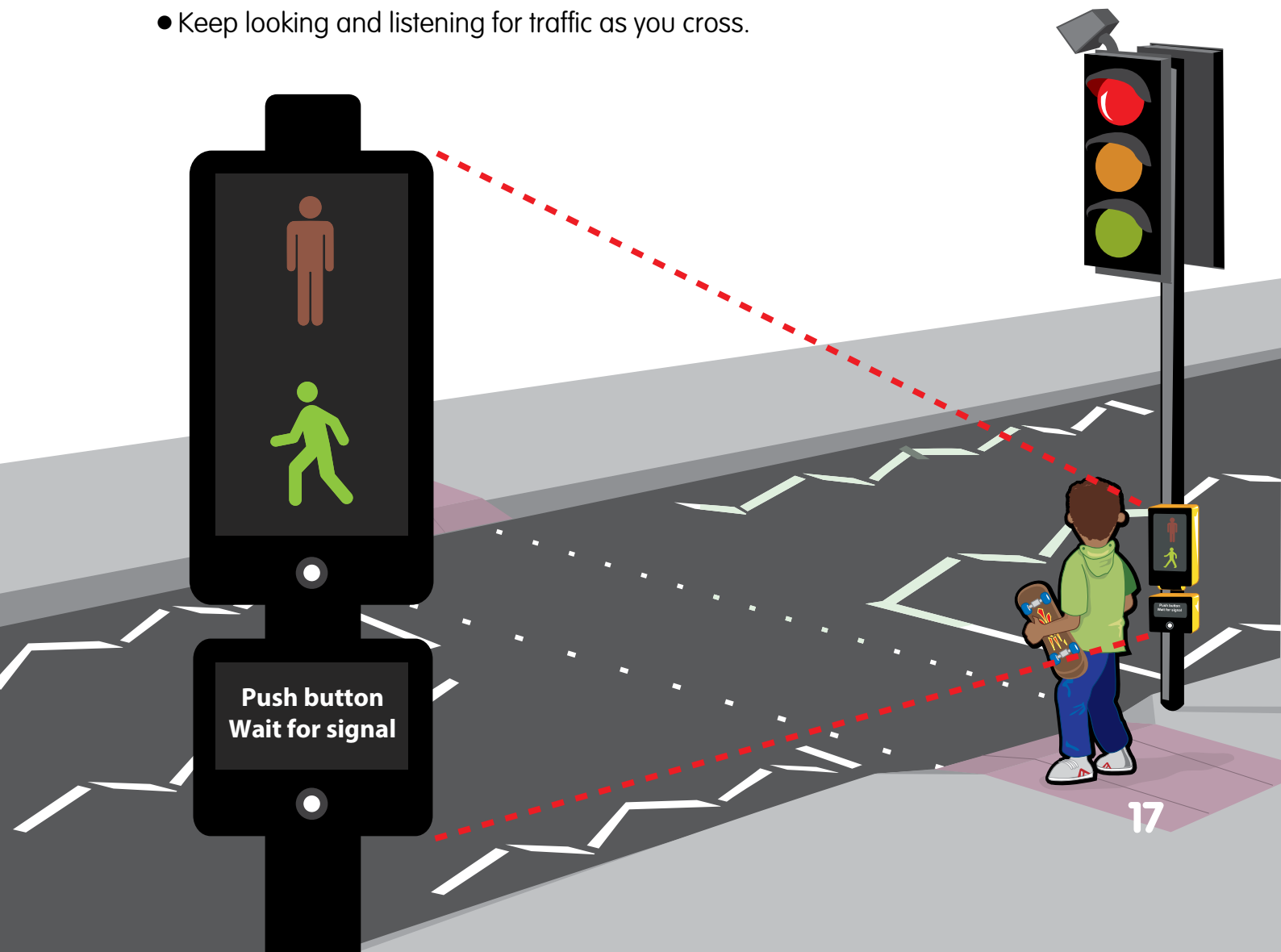


Crossing at Puffin Crossings

- Puffin crossings are very similar to pelican crossings.
- They have the **green man** and **red man** signals and a box with a button to press.
- The **green man** and **red man** signals are on a post beside you, where you are waiting to cross. There is no signal across the road.

You must keep looking at the signal post to see when it is safe to cross.

- Only cross on the **green man** signal and always check that the traffic has stopped.
- Keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.



Crossing at Toucan Crossings

- Toucan crossings have space for pedestrians and cyclists to go across the road at the same time.
- As well as the **green man** signal for pedestrians, there is a **green cycle** signal for people on bikes.
- You must push the button, like at a pelican crossing, to stop the traffic.
- Always check that all the traffic has stopped before crossing.
- Keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.



Never cross the road if the red man signal or red cycle signal is showing.



Using a footbridge

- Footbridges are designed so pedestrians can walk over the road on a bridge.
- If you see one, make sure you use it to cross the road.
- Never throw anything from a footbridge as it is extremely dangerous and could cause a serious incident.



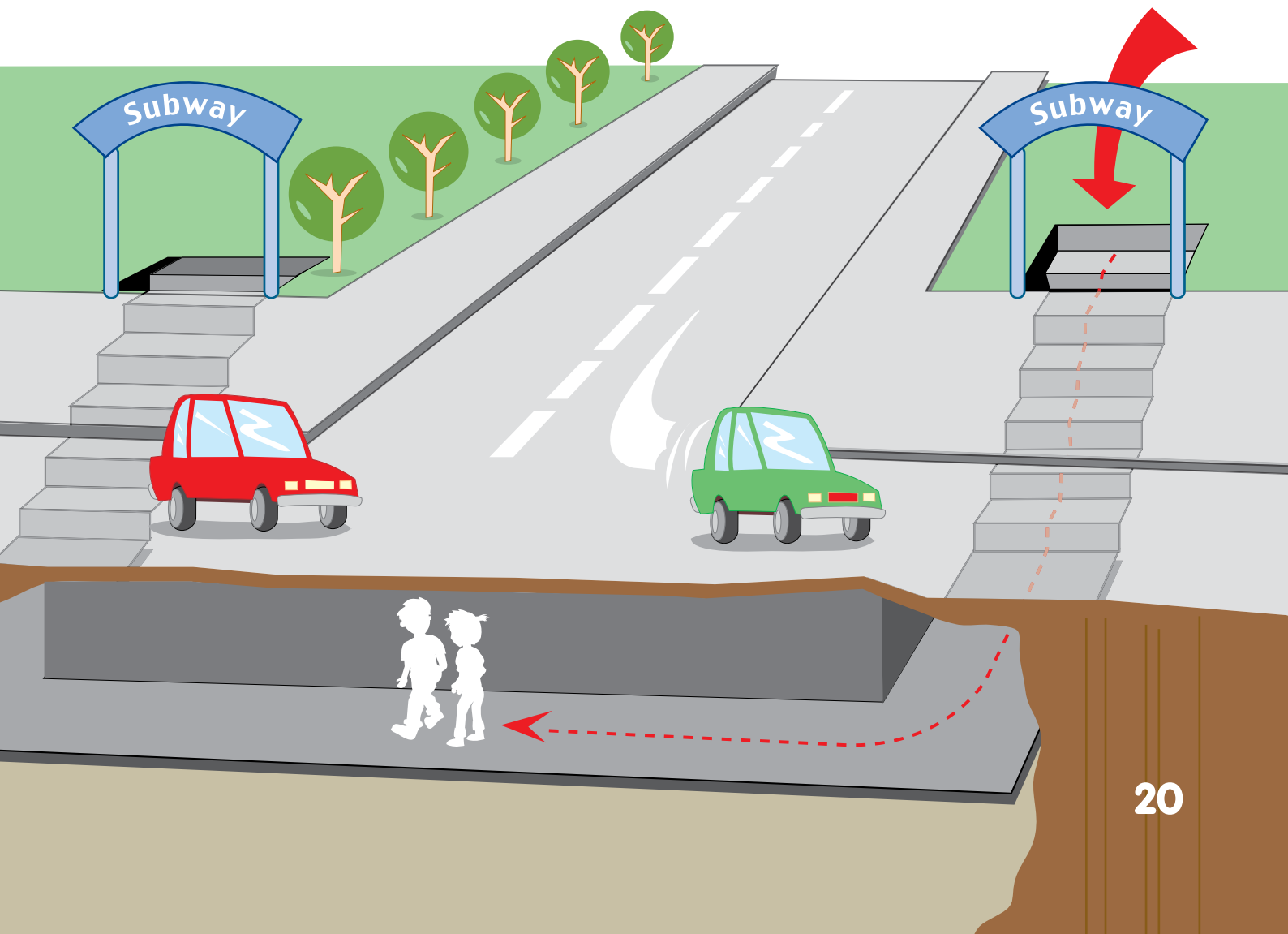
A footbridge is one of the safer places to cross the road.

Using a Subway

- Subways are tunnels under the road.
- There is no traffic in the tunnel, only pedestrians.
- If you have to use a subway, try to be with a friend or an adult that you know and trust.



If you feel unsure about using a subway, you could find another safe place to cross and use the Safe Cross Code instead.



Crossing at Traffic Islands

- Traffic islands usually have yellow and white bollards in the middle of the road.
- The bollards have a blue circle sign with a white arrow inside for drivers.
- Traffic does not stop for pedestrians at traffic islands.
- If you cross at a traffic island, you must treat the road as two roads.
- Follow the Safe Cross Code from page 14 and stop when you reach the Island.
- Use the Safe Cross Code again to make sure you get across the road safely.



Crossing at Traffic Lights

- Some traffic lights are only for dealing with traffic and not pedestrians.
- At some sets of traffic lights, you might find a special signal for pedestrians.
- This is the **green man** and **red man** signal.
- There is no button to push at traffic lights. The traffic is stopped automatically. Remember to use the Safe Cross Code.
- Be extra careful if crossing at traffic lights.
- Remember to check all around for traffic - that includes over your shoulder, just in case traffic is turning around the corner.



Wearing a hooded coat or jacket? Remember you can't see or hear clearly if your hood is up. Make sure you keep looking and listening all around for traffic.

Crossing between parked cars

- You should always try to choose a place to cross without parked cars. However, sometimes there might be parked cars right along a road, so you need to cross between them.
- Be very careful. First make sure there are no drivers in the cars you are going to walk between so the cars won't move. You should also check there are no drivers in the cars on the other side of the road as they could move off before you get safely across.
- Carefully walk out between the parked cars and stop at the edge of the car. The edge of the car is like the kerb. Follow the Safe Cross Code and remember to stop, look, listen and think before crossing the road.



Remember drivers may not be able to see you when you're standing between parked cars.

School crossing Warden or Gardaí

- These people can help you cross the road safely.
- Wait until they signal you to cross.



Always cross in front of them but keep looking and listening for traffic.

Playing safely

Always play away from roads. When you're near a road, carry balls and other stuff in a bag so you don't drop them into the road and distract drivers.

Cycling

Riding your bike lets you go places and hang out with your friends. When you're using pedal power, remember our tips...

Be seen

Clothing - light, bright colours and reflective and fluorescent materials will help drivers and pedestrians see you better.

Lights - by law, at night, you need at least one red light on the back and one white light on the front, as well as reflectors.

Wear it right

Cycle helmets should be done up securely and fit well.

Be heard

With a bell on your bike, you can warn others you're coming.

Be aware of others using the road

Make sure others using the road have seen you – check by making eye contact with drivers where you can.

Never squeeze between a large vehicle and the edge of the road – they definitely can't see you there, and be careful of vehicles turning left in front of you.

When using a path that's designed for cyclists and pedestrians to share, make sure you leave space for pedestrians.

Know the road rules

Get trained - if you're not sure how to cycle safely, ask your school about the Cycle Right Scheme.

Rollerblading, skateboarding and riding your scooter

Before you strap on your blades, jump on your board or get ready to scoot off on your scooter, remember...

- A helmet, wrist guards and knee and elbow pads will help protect you.
- Skate in special areas, like skate parks.
- Follow the same rules you would when cycling.
- Watch out for pedestrians, and remember to check driveways before you cross them to be sure no one is reversing out.
- If you're on a skateboard or scooter, always dismount and walk across the road.



Travelling safely

Being a good car passenger

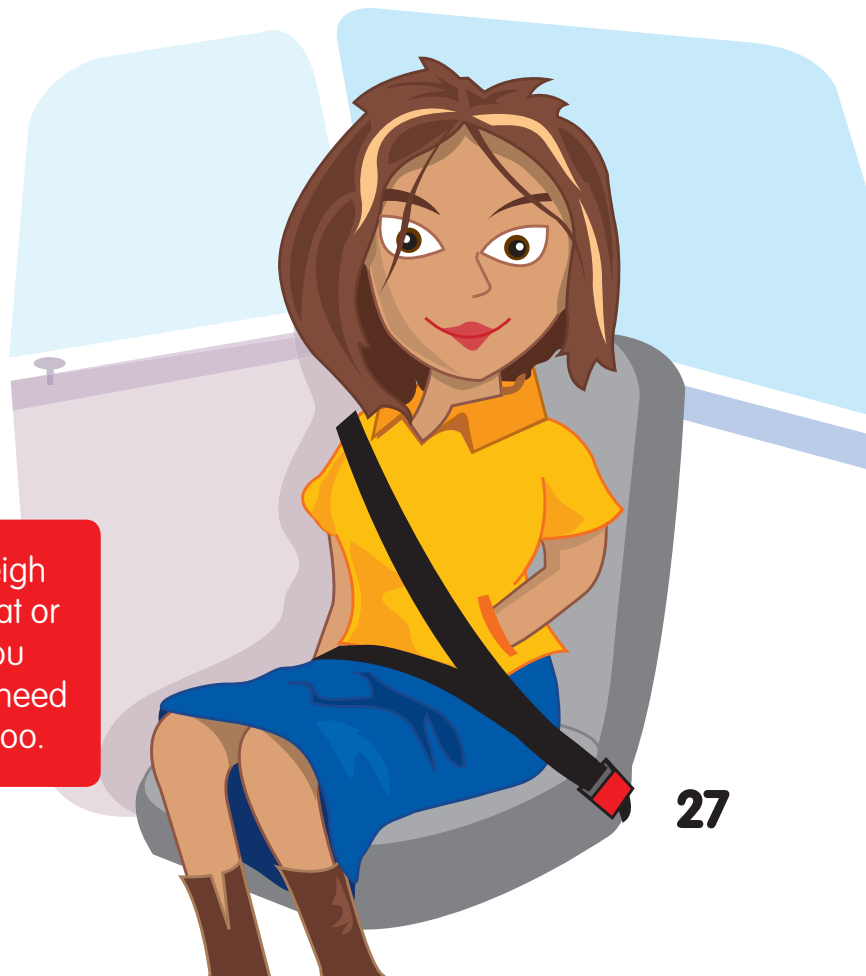
Traffic can be dangerous if the driver is not concentrating or going too fast. Here are some very important rules when you're in a car.

- **Always** wear your seatbelt.
- **Never** distract the driver.
- **Never** lean out or throw anything from the window.
- **Never** open the car door when the car is moving.
- **Never** block the rear view mirror.
- **Always** get out on the footpath side if possible.
- **Never** get into a stranger's car.

If you're sitting in the back seat, it's much safer to get out on the footpath side. If that's not possible, always remember to look out for passing cars and cyclists before opening the door.



If you're less than 150cm tall or weigh less than 36kg, you need a car seat or booster seat. It's the law. Even if you don't need a car seat you always need to wear a seatbelt. That's the law too.



On the bus

Taking the bus is an easy way to get around town.

- To stay safe, make sure you wait at the bus stop and keep back from the edge of the kerb.
- When the bus arrives, wait for people to get off before you get on.
- Never distract the driver.
- Wear a seatbelt if one is available.
- If you can't find a seat, remember to hold on tightly to one of the poles or railings in case the driver has to stop suddenly.
- If you need to cross the road after getting off the bus, wait for it to move off first, and then use the Safe Cross Code from page 14 to help you cross the road safely. If possible, walk to a safer crossing place (page 13).
- If you are only going a short distance, why not walk? It's good exercise and you may get to see things you might miss on the bus.



Out and about

Being seen

Drivers are more likely to see you if you're wearing lighter or brighter coloured clothing – especially when it's dark. You'll be seen even better at night if you wear reflective clothes, as they reflect car headlights. You can buy reflective stickers from cycle shops. Put them on your school bag or backpack (but ask your parent or carer first).

Weather warning

Ice, snow and even wet leaves on the ground not only make it more slippery when you're walking on the roads and footpaths, but drivers will find it harder to control their car and will take longer to stop. If it's rainy, misty, or foggy, they may be less likely to see you too. So remember to be extra careful in bad weather! If you wear a coat with a hood, you need to be extra careful when your hood is up as you may not be able to see or hear traffic coming from behind you or from the side. If possible, take your hood down while crossing the road and remember to use the Safe Cross Code.

Distractions

Listening to music, talking on the phone, or talking with friends while you're walking can be fun, but it can also distract you from traffic. When you're crossing the road make sure to take off your earphones, hang up your phone, and pause your conversation until you're safely across.



Helping parents and carers be street safe

If you're driven to school, remind whoever drops you off not to park on the zig-zag lines outside your school, or on a crossing. The lines are there to make it easier for people to cross the road safely. Your driver also needs to remember to stop for the School Crossing Warden.

Though it may take a bit longer, it's much safer to park in a quiet road nearby and walk to school.



You could even take the healthier option – leave the car at home and walk the whole way!

Travelling abroad

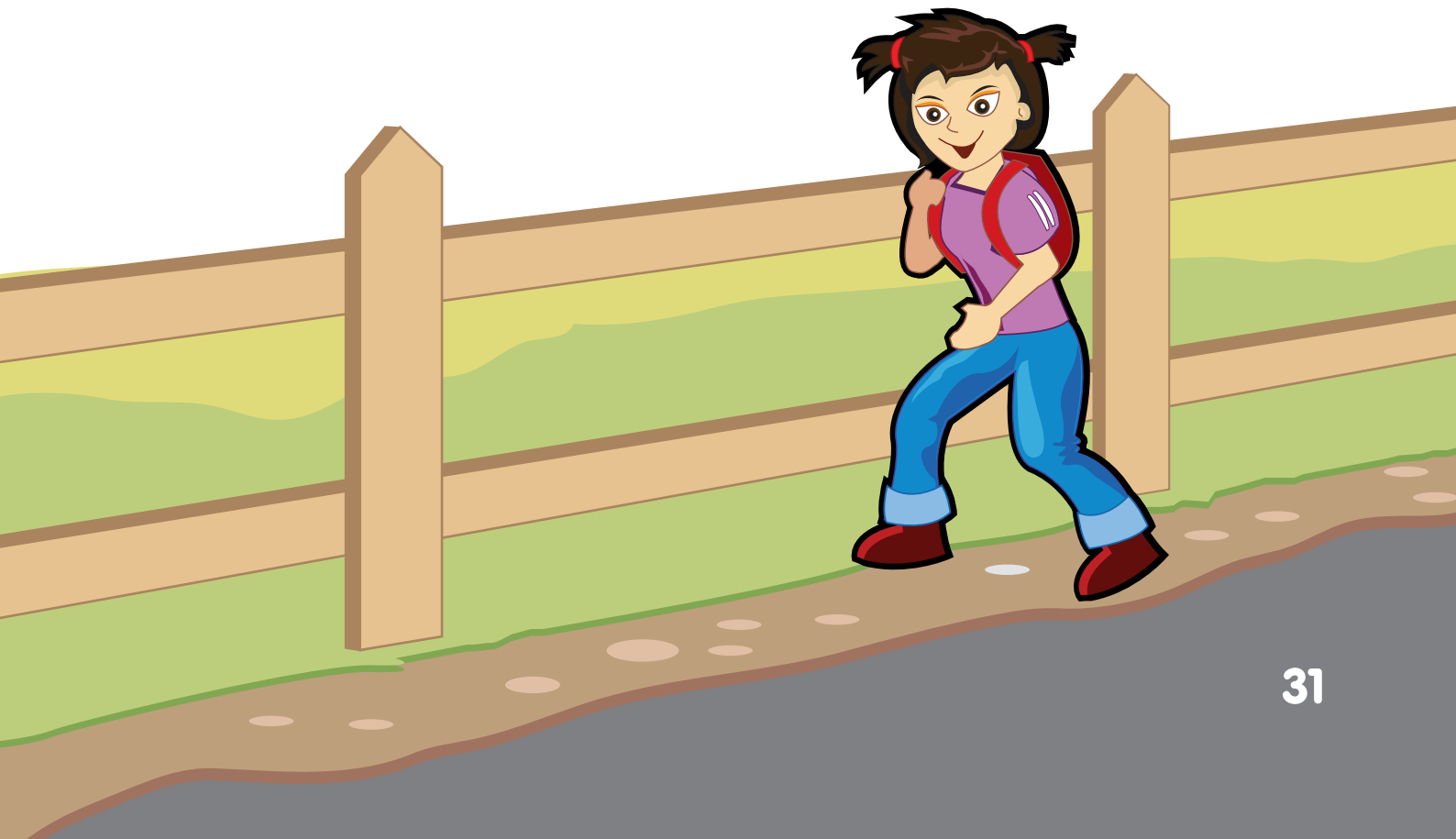
We all love having fun in the sun! If you're lucky enough to go abroad, remember our top tips for staying street safe!

Unlike Ireland, many countries drive on the right hand side of the road. So make sure you know which direction the traffic will be coming from and don't forget to follow the Safe Cross Code (page 14) whenever you're crossing the road. Lots of road rules are different in other countries, so be extra careful. For example, don't expect drivers to stop for you at zebra crossings, as it's optional in some countries. You might also find that there aren't footpaths or street lights.



Walking on Rural Roads

Closer to the countryside, you may find that the roads are narrower, with no footpaths or streetlights. If there's no footpath, you might find there's a grass verge or bank that you can walk on. If you have to walk on the road, make sure you stay as far away from the vehicles as possible. Don't walk in the same direction as vehicles are driving; face oncoming traffic so you can see vehicles coming towards you and can check they've seen you. Speed limits are also different on rural roads so remember that, although the road may be quiet, vehicles may be travelling quickly nearby, so you need to stay alert. Make sure you're as visible as possible and, if you're somewhere without street lights, it's a good idea to carry a torch at night.



Animals on the road

Riding Horses or Ponies

- Check that your horse or pony is properly shod and the saddle and bridle correctly adjusted.
- Make sure you can control your horse. If your horse is nervous, ride with other less nervous horses.
- Before you move off or turn, always look around to see if it is safe, give a clear arm signal and move off with both hands on the reins.
- Avoid roundabouts whenever possible. If you have to use one, keep to the left and look out for traffic coming onto the roundabout from other roads. Signal left before you leave the roundabout.
- You must wear an approved safety helmet and fasten it securely. Wear boots or shoes with hard soles and heels.
- When you lead a horse, always keep yourself between it and the traffic.
- Make sure other road users can see you by day and night. Fit fluorescent/reflective leg bands to your horse and wear a fluorescent/reflective jacket yourself.
- It is safer not to ride at night, but if you have to you should fit a safety light to the offside stirrup, showing white to the front and red to the rear.

Taking Care of Dogs

- Do not let your dog out by itself. Keep it on a short lead when walking on the footpath, road or a cycle path and keep between the dog and the traffic.
- If you have a dog in the car, make sure it and any other animal is restrained so it cannot distract the driver or cause injury if there is a collision. Put the animal on a lead before getting out of the car.



Mobile Devices and iPods

- When you are tuned into your mobile device you are effectively tuned out from the outside world. You must concentrate on the task that matters most whether it be walking or cycling.
- You must not use or text from a mobile phone while crossing the road.
- You cannot always hear traffic when listening to music through earphones.
- Remember to remove your earphones when crossing the road or cycling.

Traffic Survey

The following Traffic Survey can be used to measure traffic volumes at the busiest times of your school i.e. arrival and home times.

The data from the traffic survey can then be collated with suggestions made that might help reduce traffic congestion/ parking at these peak times – i.e. school traffic use a one way system, parents use a car share system.

This survey can also be used to count the number and types of vehicles that park on the zig-zag lines or that are double parked. The children could then be asked to provide suggestions how this could be reduced.

Why not report your findings in the next school newsletter or let your teacher or school principal know and ask them to take forward your solutions to the problems identified.

Children must **TAKE EXTREME CARE** when they are near vehicles.

Traffic surveys must be carried out from a safe location well away from moving vehicles, and under close adult supervision.

Consider also the use of warning signs and high-visibility clothing, if appropriate.

- **Use the door on the footpath side and only get out when it is safe.**

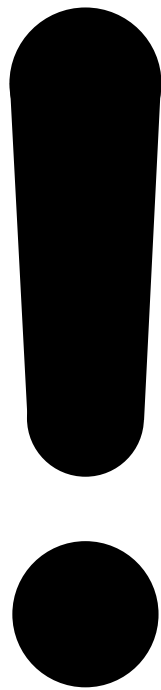
