



This area was formerly known as "The Shamblies" and the centre of the butchering trade in years gone by. The Market Cross, also located here, once a gathering point for those wishing to offer themselves into service, known as "hiring". At the junction of Sir Oige Dhufaiagh with Old Cross Square, you will find one end of what was Ireland's only canal tunnel, bringing the canal under the road and coming out over at where Mc Guirk's Fuel Merchants now stands. Most of the tunnel is still intact, under the modern day road. Mc Guirk's is sited on what was once a quay for the canal.

The Ulster Canal was built between 1825 and 1842 and was 74 km (46 miles) long with 26 locks and 16 lock keepers cottages. It ran from Charlemont on the River Blackwater to Wattle Bridge on the River Finn, south-east of Upper Louth Erne and connected the Shannon/Erne water system to Lough Neagh.

When the rail network reached Monaghan in 1858 it quickly took over as the transport mode of choice, providing quicker transportation to a wider number of destinations. The last boat travelled the canal in 1929 and it closed two years later. You can read the full story on our website...

The channel is enjoying a rebirth and again facilitating movement of people, this time along its banks, which are being developed as a Greenway.

A Greenway is defined as...
 "A recreational or pedestrian corridor for non-motorised journeys, developed in an integrated manner which enhances both the environment and quality of life of the surrounding area".

- This is a **4.5km linear route** featuring a combination of urban and rural landscapes, following the path of the Ulster Canal.
- **Trail Grade:** Class 2, Easy. Generally flat trail with even surface and some gentle slopes. Suitable for infrequent cyclists and family groups. Normal footwear can be worn.
- **Caution:** The route features some road crossings and sections adjacent to traffic, therefore it is strongly advised that children are accompanied by an adult on these sections.
- **Signs** and route markings featuring the Ulster Canal Greenway logo are provided along the route.
- **Distance:** 4.5km, which can be walked in an estimated time of 50 minutes by average users. Those who wish to walk further can continue along the Threemilehouse Road by footpath to nearby Rossmore Forest Park.
- **Terrain underfoot:** Bound tarmac surface throughout.
- **Lighting:** LED lighting is provided on the 4.5km route from dusk to dawn. Occasionally it may be switched off or reduced between the hours of midnight and 6am as a means of reducing energy.
- No big hills. **Total ascent:** 33m.



KEY INFORMATION

In 2016 many counties, towns and parishes installed Gardens of Remembrance. Monaghan Tidy Towns participated with the support of Monaghan Municipal District. All gardens would be unified by three core features, a flagpole and tri-color, seven trees in honour of the Seven Signatories and a copy of the Proclamation. In Monaghan seven plaques bearing the names of the signatories were used in place of trees. They were set in the ground surrounding the proclamation.



The Sisters of St Louis arrived in Monaghan from France in 1859. The school took both "boarders" and day students up until 1977. Today it serves as a day school for around 600 girls. The convent buildings include the convent itself, a chapel, and the school building. There is a concert hall and a gym, the latter being housed in a cut stone building which formerly served as a canal store. This can be seen just inside the convent gates at the Glen Road entrance to the Greenway. The original route of the canal past the stores can be seen.

LOCK 17: ASYLUM LOCK & LOCK HOUSE

This is one of the oldest pockets of native woodland in Co. Monaghan and contains a fantastic diversity of trees and flowering plants. The greenway passes along the edge of the wood, however other paths into the wood are there to explore and Monaghan County Council has provided biodiversity signs and a bog garden along the route.



Follow the footpath along the Threemilehouse road to the front of the gates of the estate. It provides miles of beautiful tracks, featuring man-made lakes, flowing streams, banks of wild garlic and bluebell covered hills. It also boasts a fantastic adventure playground which is suitable for children up to 12 years of age and a family cycle path. The coffee doc offers indoor and outdoor seating and an array of delightful refreshments. You'll also find a series of sculptures scattered across the park, namely, The Drumlin Giants.

Monaghan Town ULSTER CANAL GREENWAY

"Moving On" was created by artists Mark Ryan and Maree Hensy and represents the role of the canal both in the regions history and in its future. The artwork is about connectivity, renewal, making a different future, finding purpose and a peaceful way forward. A full explanation of the piece is provided on an information board at the site. Members of Monaghan Tidy Towns, Teach na Daoine's homework club, Monaghan Neighbourhood Youth Project and the National Learning Network participated in art workshops to develop the imagery featured on the sphere.
