

Minutes of Meeting of Monaghan County Council held in the Council Meeting Room, Mtek 1, Monaghan on Monday 4th July, 2016 at 11.00 a.m.

1. Casual vacancy:

- (i) To fill Casual Vacancy on Monaghan County Council arising from the election of former Councillor, Robbie Gallagher, to Seanad Eireann.

Cllr. McNally proposed the co-option of Raymond Aughey, Viscaya, Coolshannagh Road, Monaghan, to fill the vacancy on Monaghan County Council for the Monaghan electoral area. This proposal was seconded by Cllr. Coyle. The Council unanimously agreed that Raymond Aughey be co-opted to fill the casual vacancy on Monaghan County Council.

Cllr McNally then introduced Cllr Aughey to the meeting. The Cathaoirleach welcomed Cllr Aughey and wished him well for the remaining term of the current Council. All members present congratulated Cllr Aughey.

The Chief Executive, Mr. E. O’Sullivan also welcomed Cllr. Aughey and wished him every success during his term on the Council. He said he looked forward to working with him.

Cllr. Aughey thanked the Cathaoirleach, his proposer and seconder, the elected members and the Chief Executive for their warm welcome. He said he was looking forward to working with them for the betterment of the county.

2. Confirmation of Minutes

(i) Minutes of Council meeting held on 13th June, 2016

Cllr P. Treanor proposed that Item 11 of the minutes of this meeting be amended to record the name of Minister Chris Hazzard MLA instead of Minister Carál Ní Chuilín, MLA. Cllr B. McKenna seconded the proposal which was agreed by the Council.

On the proposal of Cllr Maxwell, seconded by Cllr S. Coyle it was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on 13th June, 2016, as amended, be confirmed.

(ii) Minutes of Annual Council meeting held on 20th June, 2016

On the proposal of Cllr Maxwell, seconded by Cllr Coyle it was agreed that the minutes of the Annual meeting held on 20th June, 2016, as amended, be confirmed.

3. Correspondence.

The following correspondence was circulated with the agenda:

- Email from Marian Harkin, MEP confirming that she would request the European Commission to consider introducing limits for excessive levels of calcium carbonate.
- Email from the Office of Public Works suggesting a presentation to the Council in September in relation to the draft Flood Risk Management Plans being produced under the CFRAM Programme and the EU Floods Directive.

The following correspondence was circulated at the meeting:

- Letter from Matt Carthy, MEP, relating to the Councils resolution on the issue of hard water in Co. Monaghan and enclosing a copy of a letter he had written to Commr. Karmenu Vella requesting that minimising hard water in domestic supplies be included in national policy.

- Emails from Niamh Smyth TD, Brendan Smith, TD, Senator Robbie Gallagher and Senator Joe O'Reilly confirming support for the Council's request that a meeting be organised with Minister Shane Ross, T.D, in relation to roads funding.
- Resolution from Ballybay-Clones calling on the Minister for Health to offer a better dental service for primary school children.
- Resolution from Ballybay-Clones calling on the Minister for Education and Skills to provide a full and proper school transport scheme that provides school bus transport to all pupils in the county.
- Resolution from Ballybay-Clones MD demanding greater supports/assistance to people with a disability in County Monaghan and nationally from government and all state agencies especially in the areas of education and employment opportunities.

Proposals arising out of correspondence:

On the proposal of Cllr Carthy, seconded by Cllr Conlon, it was agreed that the Council furnishes the Department of the Environment (and Minister Simon Coveney) responses from the Midlands/North West Constituency MEP's regarding water hardness with a view to putting in place a process to reduce water hardness, limescale, etc in our public water supplies.

On the proposal of Cllr P. Treanor, seconded by Cllr Carthy it was agreed that the Council support the proposal from the Ballybay/Clones MD calling on the Minister for Health to offer a better dental service for primary school children in Co. Monaghan.

Cllr McPhillips requested that she be recorded as abstaining.

On the proposal of Cllr McNally, seconded by Cllr Aughey it was agreed that the Council calls on the Health Service Executive to extend dental care to second level school children due to the fact of there being such a backlog of children who didn't receive the service over the last five years.

On the proposal of Cllr P. Treanor, seconded by Cllr Carthy it was agreed that the Council notes the update from ICBAN and the Work Plan over the coming period.

On the proposal of Cllr Coyle, seconded by Cllr McNally it was agreed that the Council adopt the correspondence/motion from Ballybay-Clones MD regarding the School Transport Scheme and seek a meeting with John Halligan TD, Junior Minister at the Department of Education with responsibility for the review of the scheme; to outline our concerns and seek assurances for the future of a full and proper School Bus Transport Scheme.

It was agreed that the resolution would be circulated to all Oireachtas members for Cavan/Monaghan and all local authorities.

On the proposal of Cllr Coyle, seconded by Cllr McNally it was agreed that the Council adopt the correspondence/motion from Ballybay-Clones MD seeking greater supports/assistance for people with a disability in County Monaghan and nationally especially in areas of education and employment opportunities.

It was agreed that the resolution would be circulated to the relevant Ministers, all Oireachtas members for Cavan/Monaghan and all local authorities.

On the proposal of Cllr Connolly, seconded by Cllr McPhillips it was agreed that the Council writes to the Department of the Environment requesting that grant aid be made available to people who experience lime in the water supply, as a means of individuals determining whether their water is hard or soft.

On the proposal of Cllr Keelan, seconded by Cllr Crowe, it was agreed that the Council calls on the Department to carry out their responsibilities in relation to hard water and also in relation to the huge problems with lime in the water in Carrickmacross and other areas of Co. Monaghan.

On the proposal of Cllr Conlon, seconded by Cllr Carthy it was agreed that this Council seeks from the LCDC and the PPN to engage in the Failte Ireland "Tourism Town" awards initiative that establishes urban and rural community networks that collaborate with local authorities in enhancing the visitor experience, particularly those from overseas.

On the proposal of Cllr B. McKenna, seconded by Cllr Conlon, it was agreed that the Council writes to all Oireachtas members for Cavan/Monaghan requesting them to lobby TII with a view to providing the necessary funding towards the completion of the realignment of the last section of the N2 i.e. from Corracrin to Emyvale village.

It was agreed that the Council receive a presentation from the Office of Public Works in relation to the CFRAM programme at the September Council meeting.

Urgent Business:

The Cathaoirleach informed the members that he had received a notice of urgent business in the names of Cllrs Conlon and Carthy and the Sinn Fein members , as follows:

That Monaghan County Council, noting the outcome of the Brexit referendum on UK membership of the European Union, recognises:

- The huge progress that has been made since the Good Friday Agreement in removing barriers between communities North and South and improving island-wide co-operation and integration.*
- That a new EU border in Ireland would be disruptive for trade, damaging for the economy and services North and South; and cause hardship for businesses, communities, farmers and workers, particularly in the border region.*

Calls on the Irish Government to:

- Work with the Northern executive to ensure that the democratic wishes of the people of the North of Ireland to remain within the EU is respected and facilitated.*
- Ensure that an island-wide solution is found that ensures that the interests of communities, workers and employers North and South, as well as the achievements of the Peace Process are safeguarded.*

Cllr Conlon requested that time would be set aside either later in the meeting or later that evening to discuss this important matter.

The Cathaoirleach stated that he was putting the proposal to take the urgent business to the meeting. A recorded vote was called for which resulted as follows:

The Cathaoirleach declared the proposal defeated.

Cllr Coyle proposed, Cllr McNally seconded that Monaghan County Council convene a special meeting immediately to discuss the consequences/challenges etc to the business, farming and communities of County Monaghan and Ireland, North and South.

A vote by show of hands on Cllr Coyle's motion resulted in 17 for, nil against.

Following a vote by show of hands it was agreed that the Special Meeting to discuss the impact of the UK Brexit Referendum on County Monaghan would be held on Wednesday 6th July at 6.00 p.m., in the Council Meeting Room, Mtek, Monaghan.

4. To receive Management Report – June 2016

The members considered the Management Report for June 2016. Queries raised by the elected members were responded to by the Chief Executive and appropriate officials.

On the proposal of Cllr Conlon, seconded by Cllr Carthy it was agreed that this Council seeks a meeting with Minister Simon Coveney to discuss issues of priority regarding the provision of housing within our county to include the protracted delays associated with the completion of the Mullaghmat Remedial Scheme.

Canada Day:

The Cathaoirleach complimented all involved with the Canada Day Celebrations held in Monaghan Town on the 1st – 3rd July, which proved to be a great success. Cllr Conlon concurred with the Cathaoirleach's comments.

Somme commemoration:

The Cathaoirleach also complimented the Museum Curator and Staff for the organisation of the Somme commemoration in Monaghan Town recently.

Cllr Carthy also acknowledged the Library staff in Carrickmacross for their contribution to the recent festival in the town and also to the Festival committee for an excellent programme of events.

On the proposal of Cllr McNally, seconded by Cllr Keelan it was agreed that the Council writes to Irish Water requesting that an 'Open Day' be arranged at the Waste Water Treatment Plant at Nafferty, Carrickmacross to let people view the Treatment plant.

On the proposal of Cllr Maxwell, seconded by Cllrs Gilliland and Campbell it was agreed that this Council writes to Minister Shane Ross, T.D., asking him not to discontinue the Sports Capital Programme going forward as it is invaluable to rural local sports clubs.

5. To consider proposed additions to Monaghan County Council's Record of Protected Structures

Mr. Ben Clerkin, Assistant Planner referred to the Report circulated to members relating to proposed additions to the Register of Protected Structures. Following a survey it was proposed that 40 additional structures at various locations throughout Co. Monaghan be added to the Register. The report described each of the structures in detail.

Cllr Maxwell declared an interest through an extended family member in relation to No. 31 on the list – a freestanding round plan three stage windmill.

Mr. Clerkin responded to queries from the members in relation to the report.

On the proposal of Cllr McKenna, seconded by Cllr Connolly it was unanimously agreed that the forty additional structures listed in the Report circulated be included in the Register of Protected Structures.

On the proposal of Cllr McNally, seconded by Cllr Coyle it was agreed that the Council calls on the Minister for Arts and Heritage, Heather Humphreys, T.D., to put in place a properly funded grant scheme to provide grant aid for repairs to listed buildings.

6. Update on marketing & promotion of Monaghan:

Ms. Dympna Condra, Tourism Officer outlined recent initiatives in relation to the promotion of the county. On the economic side, a suite of brochures 'Things to Know about Co Monaghan' had been produced – one at county level and one for each of the Municipal Districts. These were online brochures, aimed at the Monaghan Diaspora with a view to attracting them back to the county for living or working. A Connect Ireland video has been produced and four short economic videos, voiced by Audrey Carville, were in the process of being finalised. Several local business people committed to giving interviews to highlight the advantages of working and investing in Monaghan and national coverage had been achieved in press and radio as a result.

With regard to Tourism promotion, the Tourism Officer highlighted the fact that the 'My Monaghan' campaign had just commenced. This was primarily a social media campaign but would be supported by advertisements and interviews on Northern Sound and by press releases in The Northern Standard. At a national level, the Council was working with a PR company to secure press familiarisation trips to the county and several trips and articles were in progress for the summer months.

7. To nominate one representative to the Cavan Monaghan to sit on the Cavan Monaghan Mental Health Service steering group for the development of a strategic plan for suicide prevention in counties Monaghan and Cavan.

It was agreed that both Cllr P. Connolly and Cllr C. Carthy be nominated as the Council's representatives on the Cavan Monaghan Mental Health Service Steering Group, if this was acceptable to the HSE. If only one rep. was permitted from the Council that Cllr Carthy would deputise for Cllr Connolly when he was not available.

8. To approve Minutes and recommendations from CPG meeting held on 21st June

On the proposal of Cllr McNally, seconded by Cllr B. McKenna it was agreed that the minutes of the CPG meeting held on 21st June 2016 and the recommendations contained therein be approved.

9. To receive reports from Members attending Conferences/Training events

The members noted the reports from Cllrs Carthy, Coyle and Gilliland in relation to their attendance at the following conferences/training events:

10. Business submitted by Chief Executive.

Peace Campus - The Chief Executive referred to the summary Project Summary document which had been circulated at the meeting. The report outlined that a procurement process had been initiated. The process seeks to appoint consultants to design an integrated development called the Monaghan Peace Campus which would include a number of elements, including a Cultural Heritage Centre, a Youth Facility, Public Library, Community Hub that would also incorporate the Ulster Scots Agency as well as associated ancillary facilities.

Civil Defence HQ – The Chief Executive informed the members that the Council proposed to develop a new Civil Defence HQ adjacent to the Monaghan Fire Station at Annahagh. He expected that a Part VIII application for planning permission would be submitted to the Council at the September meeting.

Oifigeach Gaeilge – The Chief Executive informed the members that Nial O'Connor had been appointed part-time Oifigeach Gaeilge from 1st July, 2016.

Increase in (HAP) Rent limits: The Chief Executive advised that changes to the Housing Assistance Programme (HAP) which included new rent limits had been notified by the Department of Housing and Local Government. The revised HAP rent limits have to be applied for to the Local Authority and assessed accordingly. In order to assist HAP tenants the Council will be notifying all HAP clients of the proposed changes. A copy of the full circular would be issued to each member.

11. Matters arising out of the minutes of Council meetings held on 13th and 20th June, 2016

Matters arising out of the minutes of Council meetings held on 13th and 20th June, 2016 were responded to by the appropriate officials.

It was agreed that a further meeting with IDA/Enterprise would be sought for September.

12. To receive update on North South Interconnector project.

On the proposal of Cllr McNally, seconded by Cllr Campbell it was agreed that the Council writes to An Bord Pleanála asking when a decision will be taken on the planning application for the North South Interconnector.

13. To receive update on the Ulster Canal project.

Cllr P. Treanor requested that the Ulster Canal project would be an item on the agenda for the meeting with Minister Humphreys later that afternoon. The Meetings Administrator confirmed that it had been listed on the agenda.

14. Questions:

Cllr Padraig Mc Nally asked:

1. Has this Council received any further response from the Minister of Agriculture regarding the payment of super levy fines by hard hit farmers across Co. Monaghan?

Reply: No response received to date.

2. How many Local Authority housing units does Monaghan County Council expect to develop over the next four years under the Housing 2020 scheme, as well as further initiatives to provide i.e. purchasing (HAP).

Reply: In April 2015 Central Government set “Targets for delivery under the Social Housing Strategy 2015, 2016 and 2017” for County Monaghan. The Current and Capital combined target was set at 205 dwellings with an estimated cost of €11.5million as follows:

- 55 of the 205 to be delivered by Local Authority own construction/acquisition programme and returning voids to use with a Provisional Capital Allocation of €10.4million over the period 2015 to 2017.
- 109 of the 205 to be delivered by Local Authority A through various forms of leasing including the Capital Advance Leasing Facility in conjunction with Approved Housing Bodies.
- 41 of the 205 to be delivered through the Rental Accommodation Scheme (the Housing Assistance Payment scheme was not in place at that time).

Monaghan County Council has preliminary approval for €2.6million for the construction of 20 houses in Monaghan town and €1million for the construction of 8 houses at Bree, Castleblayney. The site acquisition for the Monaghan town project has been delayed by a legal issue so the Council has been permitted to purchase additional houses on the open market as an alternative means of providing social houses in the mean time. An initial target to purchase 15 houses per year on a rolling basis has been agreed, however given the delay in construction it has been agreed to temporarily increase the target to 30 house purchases in 2016, subject to availability of suitable houses.

Approved Housing Bodies provided 9 social houses under the Capital Advance Leasing Facility and 18 units of accommodation under the Capital Assistance Scheme in Castleblayney in 2015. There may be small numbers provided by acquisition in 2016, however it is anticipated that there will be a significantly increased provision of social housing by Approved Housing Bodies in 2017 as it is envisaged that a number of unfinished housing developments will be completed and provided as social housing in Carrickmacross and Clones.

Monaghan County Council completed 9 social houses in Clones in 2015 and purchased 13 at various locations throughout the County. 5 social houses were provided under RAS/Leasing while 175 were provided under the Housing Assistance Payment scheme. 13 social houses classed as long term voids/derelicts that required significant work and 60 casual vacancies were returned to use in 2015.

The targets and associated budgets for social housing have been set out by Central Government for Monaghan County Council for the years 2015 to 2017 only and they do not include figures for the years 2018 to 2020. In a proactive measure to ensure that Monaghan County Council is in a position to avail of additional funding should it become available, an advert for schemes of houses and land was placed in April 2016 and in May 2016 tenders were received for the provision of social houses on privately owned sites and land. The assessment of tenders has been completed and it is intended that applications totalling approximately €10million for an additional 55 social houses will be submitted to Central Government in July 2016. An offer has been made for a substantial parcel of land in one of the main towns and other parcels of land are being considered. A feasibility study for another substantial parcel of land is in progress and other land will be considered if or when it becomes available for purchase.

3. Has this Council finalised its proposals for new speed limits across Co. Monaghan as well, in particular, our housing estates.

REPLY: Monaghan County Council is currently preparing draft maps for the introduction of 30km/h in Housing Estates taken in charge by the authority.

It is proposed to circulate maps to the members of each Municipal District in July. Thereafter, proposals will be discussed at a meeting of the Speed Limits Committee with a view to commencing public consultation early August. A review of Regional and Local road speed limits will commence following completion of the review of National Road limits by the TII in October.

Cllr Seamus Coyle asked:

4. Will Monaghan County Council examine the possibility of installing play equipment in playgrounds across County Monaghan, adopted for children with disabilities, for example for use by wheelchair confined persons?

Reply: Any recently installed playgrounds in all three MD's are required to be accessible for all users. Regarding retrofitting existing playgrounds in the County, this can be examined, however, the progression of any such works will be dependent on available funding.

Cllr Noel Keelan asked:

5. a) How many grant applications have been received to date in relation to Mobility Aids (MAG), Housing Aid (HOP), and Housing Adaptations (HGD)?

Reply: MAG 42 HOP 67 HGD 36

- b) How much funding has been spent or committed to date on these grants, and how much funding remains in the budget?

Reply: BUDGET €1,156,856

APPROVED: MAG €167,850 HOP €199,610 HGD €332,834 TOTAL €700,294

- c) When will the application process for grant aid close?

Reply: As in previous years grants will close at the end of August.

6. a) How many planning applications have been received by the council to date in 2016, and how does this figure compare with 2015?

During the period from 1st January 2015 to 30th June 2015 the Planning Authority received 239 applications for planning permission. To date 276 applications have been registered in 2016 .This shows an increase of 15.5 % on last year.

- b) Is it possible to get a percentage breakdown in terms of Domestic, Agricultural, Commercial, planning applications?

The iPlan system does not collate the information in a manner that accurately supports interrogation to this level. However, the following table gives an approximation of the breakdown of categories of applications received over the six month period (January – June) in the years 2015 & 2016:

7. a) How many staff are currently employed by Monaghan County Council, and how many new staff have been employed in the previous 12 months?

Reply: The Council had 455 staff employed at 31/3/16. This included 46 retained Fire Fighters. Over the past year, the Council held competitions to fill twenty five posts that became vacant and to recruit for eleven new positions.

- b) As a result of the abolition of the five Town Councils across the county in 2014, what impact has this had if any on staffing numbers?

Reply: All staff employed by the Town Councils were amalgamated into Monaghan County Council with effect from 1st June 2014.

Cllr. Colm Carthy asked:

8. Can this Council confirm the quantity of land owned by us in Co. Monaghan (with a breakdown of land size, areas located in the county etc)?

Reply: Monaghan County Council currently have property assets comprising of 1,330 parcels of property across the county, made up of; buildings, open space, housing, Ulster canal, Water and Waste water plants, Muckno estate, roads etc. Currently there are 55 buildings (owned and rented).

9. Has there been any update on the proposed design of retaining wall and associated works to houses that join Ardross Avenue and Cloughvalley that is being reviewed by the Housing Section?

Reply: Monaghan County Council surveyed the properties and assessed the potential work that would be required to provide a retaining wall between the back gardens of two privately owned houses at Ardross Avenue, and six of the Old People's Dwellings(OPDs) at Cloughvalley (Monaghan County Council properties).

The construction of an adequate retaining wall at the location in question with fencing at the upper level would cost approximately €95,000 and access is restricted/difficult. Following construction of a retaining wall, remedial works would be required to the rear gardens costing an estimated €35,000, giving a total cost of €130,000 which equates to the entire Castleblayney-Carrickmacross Housing Planned Maintenance Budget for 2016. The Planned Maintenance Budget for 2016 is fully committed and Monaghan County Council will not be constructing a retaining wall at the location in question as the cost is excessive.

The gardens of the Monaghan County Council owned OPDs are approximately 7 metres long and the gardens of each of the privately owned houses are in excess of 20 metres long. It appears that the level of the private gardens has been raised by the private property owners, which has increased the steepness and height difference between the gardens. Monaghan County Council has no objection to the private landowners at Ardross Avenue undertaking fencing and associated works by a suitably experienced contractor to retain and secure their property at their own cost.

- Conor Duffy Ballybay on winning the 5000 metres at the National Athletics Senior Finals in Santry.

17. Conferences/Training.

On the proposal of Cllr Coyle, seconded by Cllr Maxwell, it was agreed that the Council be represented at the following training events/conferences by the members listed.
