#### Lace Gallery, Market House, Carrickmacross

#### The Initiative:

The central apex of the historic Market House building in Carrickmacross, located in the town centre, has been sensitively restored by Monaghan County Council & is home to the famous Carrickmacross Lace Gallery. The Carrickmacross Lace Co-Op (a community-run group previously situated in a small unit, just 10 sq. m) has relocated to one of the two refurbished units which is substantially larger in size (over 300 sq. m) & this will enable them to increase their level of activity in terms of workshops, classes etc. Most importantly, they will be able to accommodate tour buses & a significant increase in visitor numbers is envisaged.

The second unit has been fitted out to accommodate a 'Made in Monaghan Craft Outlet' & Monaghan County Council has advertised this space to interested operators. It is envisaged that this will be in operation later on in 2018.

#### Aims and objectives of the initiative:

The key aim is to develop a tourist attraction for County Monaghan & to increase the number of visitors to the county by providing a 'Reason to Visit'. The Carrickmacross Lace story is a key 'product' for Monaghan under the '*Ireland's Ancient East*' theme.



### **HOUSING**

#### Housing Capital Projects Commencing this Quarter

#### Latlorcan

Monaghan County Council secured funding in June 2018 for the construction of 43 homes at Plás Lorcáin, Latlorcan, in Monaghan Town. The finance for the construction of these homes by Monaghan County Council was provided by the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government under the Rebuilding Ireland Programme.

In early August 2018 Monaghan County Council appointed Geda Construction to embark on the construction of the 43 new homes. These comprise of thirty-seven 2-storey semi-detached & terraced houses with 2, 3 & 4-bedroom & six single storey 2-bedroom houses. Additional works will include open space landscaping, playground, new access roads, pedestrian access, drainage, street lighting & siteworks. The finished homes will be of high quality completed to a high standard with a Building Energy Rating of A3.

The construction works are scheduled to last 14 months, with completion due in Quarter 4 of 2019.







The official Sod Turning Ceremony by Minister Heather Humphreys, Minister for Business, Enterprise & Innovation was held at Latlorcan on Friday 10th August.

#### **Smithborough Housing Developments**

Monaghan County Council secured funding for the construction & acquisition of 17 new homes on two sites in Smithborough Village through Turnkey Construction & Acquisition Projects process in 2016 & 2017. The finance for the acquisition of these units by Monaghan County Council was provided by the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government under the Rebuilding Ireland Programme.

In July 2018 twelve 2-storey semi-detached 3 & 4-bedroom houses were acquired in an unfinished section of Maple Grove estate in Smithborough & will be brought into use as Social Housing in Quarter 4 of 2018.

Also in July 2018 construction of five 2-storey semi-detached & terraced 3-bedroom homes was completed by H. Boylan & Sons Ltd in The Meadows Estate in Smithborough providing high quality houses completed to a very high standard with a BER rating of A3. These properties are all offered & occupied.





#### Clones Renewal Scheme

Monaghan County Council are committed to dealing with dereliction in the towns & villages of the County.

10 properties, that have been derelict for up to 15 years have been acquired initially to address this problem. Funding has been provided by the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government under the Rebuilding Ireland Initiative.

The redevelopment of these units will provide 19 new apartments & 2 new town houses.

### MONAGHAN COUNTY MUSEUM

#### The Monaghan Spitfire: Life on The Border With A World At War



The museum's new exhibition; The Monaghan Spitfire - Life on the Border with a World at War launched on Thursday, June 28th 2018. The exhibition explores the story of life in Monaghan during the turbulent years of World War II with the key story being the Spitfire that crash landed in Monaghan in 1942 & the remarkable story of that plane & the world it came from.

The Monaghan Spitfire crash site was excavated in 2017 by a cross border group including Monaghan County Museum, the RAF Benevolent Fund, Queens University & students from secondary schools, north & south. The stunning finds from the dig, chief among them the famous Merlin Rolls Royce engine of the Monaghan Spitfire will form the core of the exhibit.

Second World War pilot Lieutenant Gordon Hayter Proctor bailed out of the plane moments before it plummeted into the field in Co. Monaghan. The Spitfire crashed because of massive engine failure during a flight across Northern Ireland on September 20 1942.

Museum Curator Liam Bradley explained 'The Spitfire suffered massive engine failure & the pilot bailed out'. 'As the engine is so front heavy it flew on for a few minutes but once it lost power it dipped down almost at an 80-degree angle at 400 miles an hour.' Most of the plane disintegrated on impact but the engine was buried some 3 metres below the surface. The pilot parachuted out & landed a few miles across the border in Co. Tyrone.

#### Lithuanian Centenary Event & Memorandum of Friendship with Alytus

On 6th of July 2018 the people of Lithuania celebrated 'Statehood' Day marking 100 years of the re-establishment of Lithuania as a state. To mark this occasion in Monaghan, the Lithuanian School Community & Monaghan County Council hosted an evening of celebration at the Museum. Both Irish & Lithuanian flags were flown overhead & both National Anthems were sung at 7 pm. A Memorandum of Friendship between County Monaghan & the City of Alytus, Lithuania was signed by the Cathaoirleach of Monaghan County Council, Cllr. David Maxwell & Deputy Executive Director of Alytus Municipality, Ms. Vilija Ramanauskiene.



A programme for the evening was prepared by the Lithuanian School of Monaghan, supported by the Community Development Section. As part of the celebrations for the European Year of Cultural Heritage, Monaghan County Museum were delighted to host this special event to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Restoration of the Lithuanian State. The Lithuanian School has worked with the Corporate Services section in relation to a twinning project with the City of Alytus in Lithuania.

The County of Sanctuary PEACE IV Project & the Lithuanian School of Monaghan are organising a Family Fun Day. The Fun Day will take place in Monaghan town & will give everyone an opportunity to learn about the Lithuanian culture, try some Lithuanian food & drinks. There will be games & entertainment for all the family. Taking place on Saturday 29th September this event will also mark the close of this year's Social Inclusion Week.





#### Heritage Council Award for Monaghan County Museum



Monaghan County Museum has confirmed its status as a fully accredited member of the Museum Standards for Ireland Programme at an awards ceremony at Kilkenny Castle. Established by the Heritage Council in 2006 to benchmark & promote professional standards in the care of collections, the Museum Standards Programme for Ireland (MSPI) has attracted involvement across the cultural spectrum, from national institutions to small, volunteer organisations.

## Celebrating European Year of Cultural Heritage: The Black Pigs Dyke: **18th October 2018**

On the evening of 18th October in the Market House, Monaghan, an exploration of the archaeological monument known as the Worm Ditch or Black Pigs Dyke will take place in the company of some renowned experts. Ian Doyle, Head of Conservation with the Heritage Council will introduce the event. Turtle Bunbury, author, will explore De Vismes Kane of Drumreaske House, Monaghan who was one of the early explorers & writers on the monument.

Cóilín O'Drisceoil & Aidan Walsh will bring us through the recent research, excavations & geophysical surveys taking place in County Monaghan through the Monaghan Heritage Plan. Artist, Siobhan McDonald will then explore & describe her work with the monument & how she intends to artistically render this in the coming months. Her work is funded through Creative Ireland.

This is an event to celebrate the European Year of Cultural Heritage. All welcome.



#### Interreg VA- Collaboration For Natura Network - Cann Sliabh Beagh

The official launch for this Northern Ireland-Ireland-Scotland project took place in Carrickmacross in June. Overall, the project will focus on seven protected habitats, as well as seven priority species including birds such as the hen harrier, golden plover & red grouse, insects such as the marsh fritillary butterfly, & freshwater species such as white-clawed crayfish.

Locally, Sliabh Beagh is a site set to benefit and was showcased during the recent CANN project launch in Monaghan. Dr. Rory Sheehan will be responsible for the delivery of the County Monaghan element of this project.

#### Making Waves Concert, Glaslough

On Saturday August 25th, Monaghan County Council Environmental Services in conjunction with Glaslough Tidy Towns threw a massive end of summer party to celebrate the 40th anniversary of Glaslough winning the National Tidy Towns competition & to draw attention to the environmental problems affecting this & future generations.



Over 700 attended the event to see Irish band The RipTide Movement conclude their Irish Coast to Coast Tour in Glaslough. The band are passionate about drawing attention to the problems associated with single use plastic pollution. In conjunction with Clean Coast Ireland they have been raising awareness of the effects plastic has on our marine & aquatic environment.

The event aspired to be waste free & a number of measures were put in place, including, an environmental exhibition area based on the principles of Reduce (Greener Glaslough), Reuse (Community Reuse Network) Repair (www.repairmysuff.ie) Recycle (Voice Recycling Ambassadors) & Rethink (Transition Monaghan and Reuzi).





Speaking after the event, Glaslough Tidy Towns Chairman Gareth Corrigan said "Glaslough Tidy Towns are grateful for all the help they received from volunteers & residents, not just over the weekend but throughout the year to ensure Glaslough has a chance of winning the National Tidy Towns competition."

Nial O'Connor, Monaghan County Council Environmental Services said "Co-operative events between the County Council & the local community are extremely important, we hope that everyone had a good time but also that we proved that a music festival can be organised in a way that doesn't leave huge amounts of litter or waste behind".

#### Significant Investment to Upgrade Castleblayney Wastewater Treatment Plant



Irish Water & Cathaoirleach of Monaghan County Council, Cllr Cathy Bennett, officially turned the sod for the upgrade works to the Wastewater Treatment Plant in Castleblayney in April 2018.

Working in partnership with Monaghan County Council, Irish Water is investing €6 million to upgrade the existing wastewater treatment plant to ensure capacity for future economic & population growth in the area. When completed, the newly upgraded plant will also be fully compliant with the EU Urban Wastewater Directives & ensure the continued protection of Lough Muckno.

Works have commenced on site. EPS Group have been awarded the contract on behalf of Irish Water & the project is expected to be completed in early 2019.



#### Comhairle na nÓg project supports LGBT+ young people

Comhairle na nÓg are local youth councils, that support young people to be involved in the development of local services & policies. There is a Comhairle na nÓg in each of the 31 Local Authorities. The work of Comhairle na nÓg is the responsibility of the local authority & the Department of Children & Youth Affairs (DCYA).

An AGM is held every October where we invite pupils from the 12 secondary schools & various youth organisations in the county to attend. New Comhairle members are elected & we also discuss issues & identify actions for the Comhairle to work on.

It was decided for 2018, that the newly elected committee would pursue the topic of increasing awareness of the issues facing young LGBT+ people. In January the committee invited members of a local LGBT+ support group to meet with them.

This was very informative as the group outlined some of the challenges they face in a Q&A session which included;

The lack of support in school, teachers not being fully educated on the topic, lack of sexual health education for the LGBT+ community in school, lack of education for parents & the serious strain all of this has on their mental health.

Following further workshops with 'Outcomers' in Dundalk it was agreed that our project would try to change the perspective & stigma associated with the LGBT+ community through awareness and education aimed at parents, other young people & the wider community, through a print & media campaign. Working with PH7 Design they discussed ideas for a poster campaign. We are delighted to have created a series of 4 posters which will form part of our promotional campaign that will be launched in September. The theme of our posters is "WE SUPPORT OUR LGBT+ FRIENDS" which sums up the message the Comhairle committee wants to reinforce.

#### 'A Minute Matters'

Monaghan County Council won the National Disability Access and Inclusion Award in the 2018 Local Authority Members Awards.

Our project 'A Minute Matters' was recorded by and featured local people with a learning disability who learned film making skills and then recorded a video to highlight the abuse of illegal parking in disabled parking bays.

#### Monaghan celebrates UN World Refugee Day 2018

UN World Refugee Day was marked in the county on June 20th by a celebration event organised by the management & staff of St. Patrick's Accommodation Centre, Monaghan. The event was supported by Monaghan County Council & the Peace IV County of Sanctuary Programme.

UN World Refugee Day honours the strength & courage of refugees who have had to flee their homelands due to conflict or natural disaster. At the launch of the event, newly elected Cathaoirleach, Cllr. David Maxwell extended a warm welcome, on behalf of Monaghan County Council, to all those who have sought refuge in Co. Monaghan more recently & down through the years.

Monaghan County Museum, Clones Film Festival Committee, local Garda representatives, Monaghan Fire Service with local suppliers & entertainment helped out to ensure that over 200 people enjoyed an evening of intercultural music, dance, food & fun activities.

#### Property Marking Machine Initiative

The Property Marking Machine is available for all community groups & to staff for marking Council equipment. Monaghan County Council has taken delivery of a dot peen machine, & has trained a number of staff in its use. The machine is programmed to take Eircodes, enabling it to be used to mark property of households, farmyards, businesses & community premises all around the county. The intention is to work with community groups to organise property marking events. Once a group has marked property for 50 households in their area, Council will erect signage to warn would-be thieves that a property marking scheme is in operation in the area.

Having a visible mark on an item will make it less attractive to a thief, who will find it more difficult to sell on. It will also make it possible for the Gardai to reunite the item with its owner. The depth and size of the stamp can be adjusted to suit the material being marked.

€5,000 has been set aside to support the cost of the Property Marking Scheme. Monaghan County Council is the first local authority to roll out a county-wide property marking scheme in the country, & the system set up here will become the blueprint for others to follow nationwide.

#### Changing Ireland 'Know Me' Exhibition

Monaghan County Council has produced an eye-catching booklet & exhibition that has a lot of people talking. The 'Know Me' booklet was published in March followed by an exhibition in April, to challenge discrimination & stereotyping. The booklet features a series of fictional characters based on real-life experiences of discrimination The characters are mainly linked to the grounds of the Equal Status Act.



Liam Bradley from Monaghan County Museum said the stories are all from local people with one exception. 'It had to be local stories. It had to have that local aspect to engage people. It wasn't something from another country. It's very much to do with people in Monaghan.'

"The booklet presents statements that people in our community have heard said about them & it challenges those statements with the reality of the life & the characters' said Bernie Bradley.

#### Uniting Generations Together - an Intergenerational PEACE IV Programme

This programme is supported by the European Union's PEACE IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body.

#### The Life & Times of the Great Northern Railway

This was the theme of a recent event in Clones Court House which saw Transition Year students from Largy College showcase their project 'Life on the Railway'. This project explored the impact of the closure of the railway in Clones & its knock-on effect on its neighbouring border towns.



Students produced & recorded memories of the railway station in Clones & beyond by conducting interviews with various members of older generations who could recall life in the area during that period & included stories such as: The Clones Affray 1921; The Ballynure tunnel collapse; a school trip on one of the final trains by a kindly school principal; holidays to Blackrock; day trips to Bundoran and to Lough Derg; to the 12th of July parades in Enniskillen; transporting cattle by train; & also a look back at a typical Ulster Football Final Day when thousands travelled to Clones on the GNR.

#### Remembering Together

A book capturing the memories & stories of individuals who grew up along the border was the legacy of the 'Remembering Together' project which saw students from St. Mary's National School, Threemilehouse interview service users of Drumkill Day Care Centre throughout the school year.



This project aimed to provide older people with an opportunity to reminisce about what life was like for them growing up. It also gave the younger people a chance to hear first-hand accounts of the history of the local area.

At the end of the project a book was designed & published comprising of the interviews & included a variety of subject themes such as: home life; school; celebrations; births, deaths and marriages; superstitions etc.

#### Lost Skills Revived

Passing on craft skills down through the generations was the legacy of the 'Lost Skills Revived' project, which saw students from Largy College learn forgotten crafts while working with Cairde Activation Centre in Clones & several older members of the community.



The finished craft piece, pictured with the group above, was inspired by nature, the colours of the landscape, & the creatures & plant life we are surrounded by in the border region. Through the craft of drawing, knitting, sewing, crocheting, embroidering, & producing handmade buttons from clay, the piece was brought to life. A final symbolic & visual reference was the use of a photographic image to illustrate the generations involved in the project & of the beauty of aging. The piece is currently on display in the Market House, Monaghan town.

#### Scouting Together Both Sides of the Border

Pictured recently (right) were a group of former 2nd Monaghan Town Scouts who went back to their old hang-out as part of a project, which aims to produce a book celebrating the scouting culture & heritage of the group.

During the event the ex-scouts took part in a storytelling session where they reminisced about their scouting days for inclusion in the book.

The event came to a close with the younger participants preparing a barbeque for their guests which further ignited some long-forgotten memories of their camping days.



#### The Butter Run

Friday 1st June saw the conclusion of a series of intergenerational workshops in which transition year students from the five secondary schools in Monaghan; Monaghan Collegiate School, Colaiste Oiriall, Beech Hill College, St. Macartan's Secondary School, & St. Louis Secondary School worked together with a number of adults from the locality on the 'My Life, Your Life' project to develop a film about life growing up along the border. During the workshops the older generation shared with the students what life was like for them growing up & in particular being part of a border community during the troubles.

Through the media of drama & film, the participants aimed to capture the spirit of growing up along the border summarised by one participant as "farming... most families along the border would have had a small farm of some sort, neighbour helped neighbour & the door of the house was always open with many a céilí held there & of course there would have been a wee bit of smuggling to be done too."

Over the course of the project the schools were also given the opportunity to meet with Tomi Reichental & hear his story of being put in a concentration camp when he was seven years old. Reflecting on this experience, Sarah Warman from Beech Hill College commented, "It was an honour to meet Tomi Reichental, a survivor of the Holocaust. What I really learned was that we are all the same on the inside, no matter what religion we are or where we come from."

#### Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)

The Monaghan Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) is a Committee of the Local Authority. The LCDC was established in September 2014 as part of Local Government Reform, & is made up of 17 members, 9 Non-Statutory and 8 Statutory Members.

Monaghan LCDC's main task was to develop & implement a 6 year Local Economic & Community Plan 2016- 2021 (LECP) for County Monaghan & this plan was jointly launched in July 2016 by Emer Brennan, then Chairperson of Monaghan LCDC & Cllr. Pat Treanor, Chairperson of Monaghan SPC for Economic Development & Enterprise Support. The Local Economic & Community Plan (LECP) 2016-2021 sets out the objectives & actions needed to promote & support economic development & community development for County Monaghan, for a six-year period.

Updates a& progress on actions to be delivered by all agencies are monitored & presented to the LCDC bi-annually.

#### LEADER Programme 2014-2020

Monaghan LEADER Programme 2014-2020 was launched by Minister Heather Humphreys TD in September 2016. A total budget of €7.59 million was allocated for the implementation & delivery of the Monaghan LEADER Rural Development Programme which will run until the end of 2020.



The LEADER programme provides funding for projects across the county that promote social inclusion, develop the local economy through enterprise & tourism, & protect the environment. To be eligible for funding, projects must be in line with the themes & sub-themes contained in Monaghan Local Development Strategy.

Funding is awarded based on the Local Development Strategy (LDS) for Monaghan which sets out the priority areas for the programme. The priorities in the strategy were identified through consultation with the local community, & are set out under the following themes & subtherness:

- Economic Development, Enterprise Development & Job Creation. Including sub-themes; Rural Tourism, Enterprise Development, Rural Towns and Broadband.
- Social Inclusion. Including sub-themes; Basic Services targeted at hard to reach communities & Rural Youth.
- Rural Environment. Including; sub-themes; protection & sustainable use of water resources, protection & improvement of local biodiversity & development of renewable energy.

#### The LCDC has responsibility for the following:

The LCDC have primary responsibility for co-ordinating, planning & overseeing local & community development funding in County Monaghan, examples of these funding programmes are Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme 2018-2022 (SICAP), the LEADER programme 2014-2020, the PEACE IV programme & other funding Programmes i.e. Communities Facilities Scheme, RAPID, Community Enhancement Programme etc.

The LCDC brings a more joined-up approach & better co-ordination to the implementation & delivery of local & community development programmes.

It drives meaningful citizen & community engagement in the scoping, planning, delivery & evaluation of local and community development programmes.

## Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme (SICAP) 2018-2022

The Social Inclusion & Community Activation Programme (SICAP) 2018-2022, tackles poverty & social exclusion at a local level, working with disadvantaged individuals, community organisations & public-sector agencies. SICAP is funded by the Department of Rural & Community Development & co-funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) as part of the ESF Programme for Employability, Inclusion & Learning (PEIL) 2014-2020.

The SICAP Programme 2018-2022 is managed at local level by Monaghan Local Community Development Committee with support from Monaghan County Council, & the programme is delivered by the Programme Implementer (PIs) Monaghan Integrated Development CLG.

#### Public Participation Network (PPN):

In 2014, in response to the Working Group on Citizen Engagement, Public Participation Networks were established in each local authority in Ireland. The objective was that PPNs would ensure a more meaningful approach to citizens being actively involved in local government. The Monaghan PPN is the structure & platform on which the local community can engage with Monaghan County Council. It forms the link between the Voluntary & Community, Social Inclusion & Environmental sectors & the local governing body.



#### The role of Monaghan PPN is to:

- Provide a mechanism for the Council to consult with the public on new plans/strategies, policies, services & other community supports.
- Act as a platform for groups/organisations to develop policies & positions on issues of common interest & to advocate for these with the Council.
- Through organised elections, facilitate the representation & participation of the public on Council committees (ie: Strategic Policy Committees, Local Community Development Committee, & Joint Policing Committee).
- Strengthen the capacity of groups/organisations to contribute positively to their local community & the wider county.
- Provide networking opportunities & act as a hub around which information & ideas are shared.
- Appoint a group called a "PPN Secretariat" from within its membership who manage the administration & activities of the PPN at local level. They are a committee, made up of community members. They are responsible for overseeing the day-to-day running of the PPN.

How Does PPN Work? The PPN has a "flat structure" not a hierarchical one, i.e. there is no one leader making final decisions, instead each group represented has an equal voice & opportunity to make decisions & to be heard. They do this during the Plenary meetings. Representatives are elected by PPN members to sit on committees & are supported by dedicated working groups to carry out their role.

Why Should a Group Join the PPN? It affords groups the opportunity to; network, share information, learn from other community & voluntary groups in your area, to elect representatives to policy-making boards & committees, to avail of free training for your group & other supports & to get information on funding, grants & initiatives of interest to community.

## Decade of Commemorations Programme

The Decade of Centenaries programme aims to commemorate each step that Ireland took between 1912 & 1922 in a tolerant, inclusive & respectful way. The Library Service is coordinating the 'One Book One County' reading programme as part of the Decade of Commemorations. Each year, one book is chosen which relates to early 20th century Irish history, which schools & the general public are invited to read, participate in workshops & events. This year over 30 primary schools participated in the programme which involved around 1000 children reading the book 'A Winter of Spies' by Gerard Whelan based on the War of Independence, discuss the themes of the book, partake in reenactment workshops & other creative workshops.



## Cavan-Monaghan Science Festival 10th - 24th November 2018

The award winning festival will run for its 3rd year from 10th − 24th November across counties Cavan & Monaghan, led by the Monaghan Library Service. With hundreds of talks, workshops, hands on activities, family fun day & adventures into the unknown worlds of science technology planned. The aim of the festival is to promote & stimulate interest in science, technology, engineering, arts & maths along with considering of the importance & relevance of these to everyday life. The festival receives maximum funding of €35,000 from Science Foundation Ireland. See website

#### **Monaghan Makers Project**

From 'Inspiration to Creation', The Monaghan Makers project is designed to meet the needs of young imaginative people aged 13-24 & is being delivered across the county. This action packed multi-skills programme uses modern technologies & training techniques to bring young people together to inspire new ideas & explore new possibilities. The project brings young people on a wide ranging journey through cutting edge science, technology, art & design that respond to some of the new opportunities that young people are presented with in the modern technological world. The new skills being developed will help to enhance their capacity to break down technological challenges, how to be creative and problem solve, which are critical life skills. The project will work with 100 young people over a period of 15 months.

The aim is to encourage & inspire children & young people to enjoy the experience & magic of reading. Monaghan Libraries have organised a programme of events that includes authors, illustrators, writing workshops, storytellers & yoga storytelling. We aim to continue supporting Irish authors & artists in our programme.



#### Creative Ireland

Creative Ireland is a government led, cross-departmental culture-based programme designed to promote individual, community & national well-being. Enabling creativity in every community is a core pillar of the Creative Ireland Programme, an ambitious five-year initiative, from 2017 to 2022, which will place our strongest assets, our culture & creative communities, at the centre of public policy.

In 2016, Monaghan County Council demonstrated their unique capacity to activate & support community engagement & participation in marking the Centenary year through a wide range of arts, culture & heritage initiatives.

Creative Ireland aims to build on this success with the establishment of a Culture & Creative Team, & an ambitious five year plan which has collaboration, co-operation & challenge at the heart of it. This new strategy challenges us to connect to our creativity in a personal & community context with resulting wellbeing, social & economic benefits for us as individuals & as a county.

The Culture Team will oversee & roll out an annual programme which includes a community engagement scheme. For more information contact Programme Coordinator Deirdriú McQuaid.

#### Google & Public Libraries 2020 Project

Based on a pilot project in the USA between public libraries & Google, they wish to expand upon this work with libraries in Europe. A number of libraries in Ireland & the UK were chosen based on library proposals & experience. Monaghan Libraries was one of four libraries in Ireland chosen because of our experience in Outreach & Education programming particularly in the fields of digital technology, science & establishing collaborations.

Over the course of 6 months, the library will roll out a number of learning initiatives under three pillars (1) Computer Science (2) Online Safety (3) Applied Digital skills. A series of lesson plans will be developed & form part of the overall toolkit which will be launched in Brussels later this year for public libraries across Europe to access. The programme aims to increase access & exposure to digital & computer science education for youth & adults, to prepare people to understand how to navigate the digital world as well as how to be successful in the 21st century job market.







#### Libraries Ireland

#### FREE Membership & Access to over 15 million items

Launched in May 2017, every library in Ireland is effectively now your local library. All public libraries are now operating as a single shared system.

So what does this mean?— Basically anyone with a valid public library card from any library authority can borrow & reserve items from all 333 library branches in the country. Items are collected & delivered between libraries on a twice-a-week basis, & once a reserved item is available it should arrive in your local library within a week.

The new service provides a single access for library members to over 15 million items & you can reserve up to 12 items at a time. You can do this when you visit a library or you can request online from home. The Libraries Ireland service also provides free access for library members to a huge range of online resources, e-books, e-audiobooks, e-newspapers, e-magazines, e-courses & e-languages.







#### eResources @ Your Local Library

The Library provides free access to a range of online e-resources to all registered members of the service. This includes access to thousands of e-books, e-audiobooks, full colour digital magazines, online newspapers, mango languages & over 500 courses in the Universal Class. #### **Energy in Monaghan County Council**

Over the past 4 years, Monaghan County Council has participated in the SEAI Better Energy Communities scheme to implement measures to reduce energy usage & generate renewable energy. Like all Local Authorities, Monaghan has an obligation to reduce its energy consumption or improve its energy efficiency by 33% by 2020.


We are currently on track to achieve this target. One example of a recent BEC project was the installation of Solar PhotoVoltaic panels on the roof of the Carrickmacross Civic building. PV panels convert solar energy into electrical energy that is used instead of importing from the ESB grid. The photo below shows the PV installation & the graph shows the energy yield [8105 kWhr] from these panels for 2017.

#### **Public Lighting in Monaghan County Council**

There are 5600 Public Lights in County Monaghan. Each year our Public Lighting uses just over 2.9 GW of electrical energy, 58% of our total electrical energy usage within the county. To reduce this consumption there is currently an LED retrofit program being carried out to replace the old orange & yellow lighting with white light LEDs that will reduce the Public Lighting energy consumption by 50% while maintaining or improving the quality of lighting. To date we have approximately 20% of our old lights retrofitted & it is planned to have all completed by end of 2020.
