On the proposal of Cllr P Connolly, seconded by Cllr H McElvaney, it was agreed that this Council support the motion from Sligo County Council calling on the HSE and the Department of Health to end the practice of pursuing patients, including cancer patients with private commercial debt collection agencies and to review exemptions to the inpatient charge by the Department of Health.

On the proposal of Cllr B McKenna, seconded by Cllr S Conlon, it was agreed that further to the confirmation at the Dail’s Public Accounts Committee by Peter Walsh, Chief Executive of Transport Infrastructure Ireland that the TII will re-prioritise its road project proposals on the instruction of Government, Monaghan Co Council calls on Minister Heather Humphreys to lobby Government colleagues to ensure that funding is assigned for the Clontibret to Border road scheme in 2022 in order to allow this vital infrastructure project to advance to the next phase of planning and design.

On the proposal of Cllr S Coyle, seconded by Cllr A McCooey, it was agreed that this Council acknowledge the reply on behalf of the Minister for Education, Norma Foley TD, in relation to the ‘Action Plan on Bullying’ etc and request the Minister to appoint to the Steering Committee for the Review, teacher representatives, as school teachers, principals and staff are in the front line of preventing, monitoring and dealing with bullying in the educational sector and that the

responsibilities and penalties be clearly defined.

On the proposal of Cllr S Coyle, seconded by Cllr A McCooey, it was agreed that this Council acknowledge the new initiatives and additional services at Monaghan General Hospital, but seek the immediate increase to 24 hours, 7 days a week of the opening hours of the Minor Injury Unit and the provision of additional services at the Monaghan General Hospital site to assist in the alleviation of overcrowding at other Hospitals in the Dublin North East Region as a result of the increased waiting times for treatments and procedures during the past two years of restrictions due to the Covid-19 Pandemic.

On the proposal of Cllr S Conlon, seconded by Cllr P Treanor, it was agreed that this Council request Minister Heather Humphreys TD for an opportunity for a delegation to meet her and relevant officials to discuss issues of significant importance affecting our constituents including the termination of the N2 Clontibret to the Border road scheme, North South Interconnector and the Monaghan Hospital Minor Injuries Unit.

On the proposal of Cllr P Treanor, seconded by Cllr S Conlon, it was agreed that this Council would re-write to Minister Foley, TD, and seek an opportunity to make a submission in response to the reviews of the School Transport Policy.

On the proposal of Cllr N. Keelan, seconded by Cllr P Treanor, it was agreed that this Council write again to the CEO of Eirgrid, Mr Mark Foley, requesting that he responds to the following questions:

- 1. Approximately what percentage of affected landowners in County Monaghan or in the other affected counties has Eirgrid established a good working relationship with and are content with the proposed pylon supported 400kv line to pass through their property?*
- 2. How is it proposed to construct the North South Interconnector and develop new accesses onto private lands where no consent exists and given how strong private property rights are in this country?*
- 3. How is it creditable that Eirgrid and its agents are pushing ahead with this project and entering onto lands before the Government commissioned review is concluded and the outcome known?*

On the proposal of Cllr N. Keelan, seconded by Cllr P Treanor, it was agreed that this Council write to all the Oireachtas members for this constituency requesting that they assist the members of Monaghan County Council in our efforts to get a speedy response to our questions and concerns.

17. Questions

Cllr S. Conlon asked:

1. Further to issues I raised at the November and December meeting regarding outstanding development fees that went unpaid by the builder / developer on dwellings at Wylies Hill Ballybay, and now to be paid by homeowners seeking a 'Letter of Compliance' for conveyancing purposes when selling the property, I ask, for the purpose of fulfilling conveyance criteria, what number of dwellings at this location are in a state of arrears and are liable for payment to the Council and required to ensure a seamless sale transaction?
2. Of the 39 Unfinished Housing Developments declared in an April 2018 Council report, what number of dwellings at these locations across the County are liable to make

payment to the Council when seeking a 'Letter of Compliance' in the event of the sale of a house at a former UHD or 'ghost estate' where the Developer failed to pay development levies?

3. In the event of homeowners living in a former Unfinished Housing Development, and having an outstanding charge against their property due to the builder / developer failing to pay required development fees, I ask, for the purpose of negating the financial impact of index linked payments that continue to increase, are these homeowners going to be contacted by the Council to establish an arrangement for payment?
4. For homeowners who purchased a dwelling in what was to become an Unfinished Housing Development and completed the transaction prior to the builder / developer declaring insolvency and not paying the appropriate development fees to the Council, I ask for explanation on why these homeowners are now liable for a charge, created by a failed builder, that did not exist at the time of their purchase 'in good faith' of their home.
Reply to Questions 1-4: Where a solicitor writes to the Planning Authority as part of the conveyancing process, the Authority is obliged to give clear factual responses to the queries raised. The responses provided are relied upon by the purchaser to confirm compliance, safeguard their investment, and where appropriate raise finance.

Following the economic collapse in 2007/2008 there were 42 developments in the county which were left in an unfinished condition by the respective developers. The degree to which they were unfinished varied significantly, as did their compliance with the relevant planning conditions. Where possible, developers and financial institutions were pursued through the enforcement process in an attempt to ensure that these developments were completed, and contributions paid. Unfortunately, and for various reasons, this process was not always successful. In the intervening period, since the collapse, the Council, supported in some cases by the Department, intervened to resolve safety and infrastructural issues in many of these developments.

The Planning Authority is not in a position to confirm the number of individual dwellings within the identified unfinished housing developments which may not have had their contributions paid by the relevant developer. To determine this, a significant body of work, involving a substantial investment of staff resources would be required.

In respect of Wylies Hill, Ballybay, the Planning Authority can confirm that of the 116 dwellings constructed in the development, contributions have been paid in full for nine of these.

While the Authority is not pursuing the payment of any outstanding development contributions in these identified developments, it shall continue to fulfill its obligations in respect of responses to conveyancing queries.

5. That this Council seeks itemised data from Irish Water of the Waste Water Treatment Plants under its responsibility in County Monaghan in relation to the quality of discharge of final effluent, and to what extent it meets the established criteria for minimum standards as required for a Certificate of Authorisations (CoA) issued by the EPA over the past 3 years relating to each WWTP.

Reply: Approximately 6 hectares of short rotation coppicing willow has been planted in Clontibret and 7.5 hectares in Knockatallon. Since 2012, approximately 4.5 hectares has been harvested in Knockatallon.

No profits has been generated or cost. Land leases range from 10 to 20 years. Clontibret Wastewater Treatment Plant will be allocated funding under the Small Towns and Villages Growth programme. Under the programme, projects throughout the country have been allocated funding to date. Working in partnership with Local Authorities, this

investment in the local wastewater infrastructure will provide additional capacity for the development of new homes, and support the Government’s Housing for All initiative, while ensuring that wastewater continues to be treated to an appropriate standard. Further updates on the budget and timelines for delivery will be provided in due course.

Cllr C. Carthy asked:

6. How many homeless presentations were made to Monaghan County Council in 2021 (with a breakdown for each quarter and Municipal District area)?

Reply: In 2021 there were 97 presentations - 60 adults and 11 children. Some people presented on a number of separate occasions: -

7. When is it expected that the Carrickmacross Group Home will be open and operational?

Reply: According to the latest update from the HSE:

The Care Provider “Resilience” has been appointed by the HSE and the lease agreement between Respond and the HSE was agreed in January 2022. Official handover of keys for the property from Respond to the HSE is imminent.

8. How many applications were made to Monaghan County Council under the ‘Repair & Lease’ scheme in 2021 (with a breakdown of MD Area, successful/unsuccessful, house type/size etc) and does this Council envisage and advertising campaign to be launched in 2022 to promote this scheme to owners of derelict , unused or vacant houses?

Reply: Monaghan County Council received a total of 6 applications for the Repair and Lease Scheme in 2021 and all 6 applications were deemed unsuitable. Please see table below for further detail on each application.

The table below shows the that the national targets for Repair & Leasing are relatively low. Monaghan County Council does not intend to advertise the Repair & Leasing Scheme in 2022 because the numbers required under Repair & Leasing are low and Monaghan County Council prioritises ownership of housing and construction of new housing ahead of leasing. However, all applications to the scheme will be assessed and if suitable will proceed.

CLlr N. Keelan asked:

9. Given the alarming rise in domestic violence against women in particular, and indeed men across the country and here in county Monaghan what progress if any has been made in putting in place emergency accommodation within our county?

Reply: Monaghan County Council met with Siobhan McKenna, Manager, Tearmann Domestic Violence Services in Quarter 4 2021. Tearmann propose to develop crisis accommodation and ancillary support services in Monaghan. Monaghan County Council have committed to work with Tearmann to identify a suitable site in Monaghan. A site options appraisal will take place following the development of a concept accommodation need / design by Tearmann

10. Given the lack of housing units to rent or buy in county Monaghan including the huge increase in rents and the cost of purchasing a home that may be on offer, what options could be available for those individuals and families who do not qualify for social housing supports , including affordable housing / housing loans etc under (housing first) government policy?

Reply: One of the tasks outlined in the "Housing for All Plan" launched in September 2021 was to launch a newly expanded home loan scheme. The new Local Authority Home Loan Scheme became effective on 4th of January 2022 replacing the former Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan scheme.

There are a few changes to the scheme relevant to Monaghan (outlined below). Take up of this scheme should be encouraged as it remains a very competitive and attractive loan scheme with very low Fixed interest rates of 2.495% for 25 Years and 2.745% for 30 years (rates application at current date and subject to change). It should be noted that applicants (excluding Tenant Purchase) must provide proof of insufficient mortgage offers from two regulated financial providers.

- Clarification of joint/single applicants – i.e. married persons, persons in civil partnerships, or persons in committed and intimate relationships must apply together
- A 'Fresh Start' principle also applies to LAHL
 - people who are divorced, legally separated/separated or the relationship has ended and have no interest in, or any financial obligation for any borrowings in respect of the family home are now eligible to apply under this scheme.

- people who have undergone personal insolvency/bankruptcy proceedings, in which they had to give up their home, will also be eligible to apply for LAHL
- Clarification that 10% deposit applies to borrowers availing of the LAHL scheme to obtain a house under affordable purchase schemes, with the exception of houses sold under tenant purchase schemes;

Removes the limitation of 175 sq. metres on the size of a property that can be purchased or self-built.

Affordable Housing

County Monaghan is deemed an affordable place to live as the average cost in County Monaghan of a second-hand home is currently less than the cost of building a new home.

Monaghan County Council are awaiting the outcome of the Housing Need Demand Assessment (HNDA) that is currently being undertaken by consultants appointed by Planning Section, however, the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI) has predicted that there is no current housing affordability gap in County Monaghan and a Local Authority led affordable housing scheme is not feasible in County Monaghan at present.

Extract from 'First Home' Affordable Purchase Shared Equity Scheme

The 'First Home' Scheme will be available to first-time buyers seeking to purchase a newly built home in a private development anywhere in the country. This scheme, jointly supported by the State and participating retail banks, aims to bridge the gap for eligible purchasers between their deposit and mortgage, and the price of the new home within price ceilings established across the country.

Through the scheme, the support provided will take the form of a percentage equity stake (share of the ownership) in the home equal to the difference between the open market value of the property and the price paid by the purchaser. Work on the final design of the scheme is ongoing, including engagement with key stakeholders. Full scheme details, including terms and conditions, will be announced ahead of its commencement in early 2022.

11. With the covid restrictions thankfully coming to an end will the executive outline what will a return to work for all the council employees look like in the time ahead including a mix of working from home and in our civic offices?

Reply:

Phased Return to the Workplace

Monaghan County Council has commenced a phased return to the workplace in line with Government advice relating to the unwinding of Covid-19 restrictions.

Blended Working

The Tánaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment Leo Varadkar TD, published Ireland's first National Remote Work Strategy on the 15th January to make remote working a permanent option for life after the pandemic. The Strategy sets out plans to strengthen the rights and responsibilities of employers and employees, to provide the infrastructure to work remotely, and sets out clear guidance on how people can be empowered to work remotely from the office. A Blended Working Framework is being developed for the Sector. Blended working allows employees, where the role is appropriate, to choose whether they would like to work from home/hub, the office, or a mix of both, effectively a working environment that combines on and off-site working. The work being undertaken remains the same but the location where it is being undertaken is flexible. Blended working will not of itself change the nature of the role or the substantive duties to be carried out by the employee, however, it will require all employees to be more flexible in the undertaking of their duties both in the

remote and office-based environment. Monaghan County Council are in the process of planning for a blended working environment and will implement Government Policy on blended working following the completion of the legislative process and the completion of a blended working framework for the sector.

12. Given that the Clontibret to the border road scheme is now shelved for the foreseeable future, what is the current status of the Ardee to Castleblayney road scheme including a design and proposed land take which would give some certainty to local residents and the farming community in terms of future expansion of farm enterprises and also to those who wish to build a family home adjacent to the proposed route?

Reply: An allocation of €1,000,000 has been received from TII for the N2 Ardee to Castleblayney Road Scheme to continue to progress the Phase 3 Design & Environmental Evaluation process in 2022. Any outstanding surveys and studies are being completed, which will allow Jacobs to develop the alignment of the road, design sideroads, accesses and junctions, and to identify the required landtake for the road scheme. Initial designs for the route are expected to be available in Q3 2022, which will allow meaningful discussions with affected landowners to take place from this point. The format for these discussions will be considered over the coming months.

13. In relation to rural planning, has there being any update from the department in relation to the local needs policy (locals only) in light of the 2013 Flemish decree which deemed this policy to be illegal, could the planning office give some assurance or comfort to rural communities across our county that rural planning policy will remain as it is at present given the concerns that government may change policy to make it much more difficult to obtain planning permission in rural areas ?

Reply: The Planning Authority has received no update from the Department in respect of rural housing policy and there is currently no expectation that the related policies contained within the Monaghan County Development Plan 2019 – 2025 shall be amended. If in the event however that revised guidance or policy is issued by the Department, then a formal review could be required.

Housing Capital Update on 2021 delivery

Due to the shutdown in construction activity in January 2021 as part of the national effort to halt the spread of COVID-19, several social housing sites in County Monaghan were not permitted to remain open as they were not nearing completion at that time. This has had a direct effect on the delivery of social housing in 2021, providing a shortened 9 months construction period for these sites.

The projected total for 2021 was 101 new social houses, unfortunately due to delays with Approved Housing Body projects the actual total provided was 76 new social houses.

The overall spend on the 76 new social houses in 2021 was over €14 million.

The breakdown of ownership of new social houses in 2021 was 25% (19 properties) Council owned houses and 75% (57 properties) Approved Housing Bodies houses.

In addition, 51 social houses owned by Monaghan County Council were re-let in

2021.

Please see Table below for number of units, location and delivery breakdown. The sizes of homes to be completed are as follows; 2-bedrooms 40%, 3-bedrooms 50% and 4-bedrooms 10%.

Although not counted in the Rebuilding Ireland/Housing for All figures, the Final Phase redevelopment of Gortakeegan Halting Site was completed in December 2021. These works consist of the conversion of 12no units to provide 8no 1 & 2 bedroom dwellings. With the completion of the project there are now 14 dwellings available providing one and two bedrooms. Eight number 1-bedroom dwellings and six number 2-bedroom dwellings.

The combined total number of the social houses above that were made available for letting in 2021 was 135.

Monaghan County Council proactively manages all Housing construction projects to ensure that delays are avoided or minimized if unavoidable.

Housing Capital Update on 2022 delivery

The projected total for 2022 is 130 new social houses with a budget of over €31 million.

The breakdown of ownership of new social houses in 2022 will be 65% (85)

Council owned properties and 35% (45) Approved Housing Body properties. The breakdown of sizes of new social houses in 2022 will be 55% (72 properties) 1 or 2 bedrooms, 35% (45 properties) 3 bedrooms and 10% (13 properties) 4 bedrooms houses. This is an increase of 15% in 1- or 2-bedroom sized houses in 2022, compared to 2021.

Under the terms of the funding agreement, projects have until 31 August 2022 to complete their works and have all funding fully drawn down.

17. With the very successful housing regeneration works carried out by Monaghan County Council in Clones - Can the Housing section of Monaghan County Council investigate a similar plan for Muckno Street in Castleblayney where there is a number of derelict houses/shops etc.?

Reply: According to the latest report on vacancy and dereliction, published by the Northern and Western Regional Assembly, County Monaghan has one of the lowest residential vacancy rates in the region however at 6.9% it is higher than the 4.9% national average. The table below from the report shows that Castleblayney has one of the lower residential vacancy rates at 2%. According to the report the residential vacancy rate for Castleblayney was 53% lower in 2020 than it was in 2015. At present Monaghan County Council is focussed on addressing the high residential vacancy rates in Ballybay (9.3%) and Clones (5.9%) but is also making plans to tackle residential vacancy in other towns in County Monaghan which will include examination of derelict houses / shops in Muckno Street in due course.

18. With the significant pressures on Lough Muckno water quality and the quality of the water being described as Bad Status and Eutrophic and with the project called “Muckno Road recovery project” being progressed by Environmental Services.

- (a) What plans are in place to accelerate this project giving the Bad status of the water quality?

Reply: Phase 1 of the project has commenced. Environmental staff are currently collating available water chemistry data, acquiring additional monitoring stations on the feeder streams and the consultant is soon to install data loggers in the catchment. Lake cores will take place in April. NUI Galway will be assisting the council in the coring work. Data collection, sample analysis and forecast modelling will run until April 2023. This phase of the project is scientific in nature and results will determine lake recovery time giving baseline conditions and reduction in nutrients. Phase 2 which will focus on Integrated Catchment Management which may possibly be accelerated if additional funding can be secured in collaboration with other agencies and focus groups.

- (b) What will the key elements of this project be?

Reply: Phase 1 will attempt to predict using modelling a recovery period for

Lough Muckno using sediment analysis and profiling. It will also determine the loadings from each feeder stream into the lake and help clarify reference conditions for the lake. This work will help us assess what the water quality in the lake was over a significant time period and from that we hope to be able to determine what improvement in lake quality is achievable in the future.

- (c) What plans are in place for consultation with all the stake holders for this Intergrated Catchment Management plan for Lough Muckno to improve the water quality of Lough Muckno?

Reply: The development of an Integrated Catchment Management (ICM) Plan is the second phase of this project and it is hoped to commence work on this upon conclusion of phase 1 of the project.

- (d) What mitigation factors are being put in place to stop the steady decline in water quality for Lough Muckno?

Reply: The ICM process will identify pressures in the catchment of the lake. Catchment modelling and loading rates from phase 1 will form part of the process. Mitigation will focus on individual pressures and be site specific as opposed to general measures.

That this Council notes with deep concern the very slow rollout of the national broadband scheme under (NBI) across the country including here in county Monaghan with targets dates been missed for its delivery to homes and businesses, given that high speed broadband is now a critical piece of infrastructure for all our citizens, that this Council writes to An Taoiseach Micheal Martin TD, Leo Varadkar TD, Minister for Enterprise Trade and Employment, Eamon Ryan TD, Minister for Environment Climate and Communications requesting that whatever extra resources are necessary be provided to accelerate the delivery of broadband. We also write to all the Oireachtas members for this constituency seeking their support and that we request a response from all concerned .
