Works on the exterior and structure of Monaghan Peace Campus has made good progress in recent months. The installation of the structure for the Level 4 Community room completes the reinforced concrete and structural steel structures of the building. The scaffolding has now been taken down to reveal the brickwork. The first windows were fitted in October, this was an important milestone towards sealing the building. Heritage Officer presents evidence to the Citizens' Assembly on Biodiversity Loss

A Citizens' Assembly on Biodiversity Loss, with a total of 100 members including an independent Chairperson and 99 randomly-selected members of the public, has been convened to examine how the State can improve its response to the issue of biodiversity loss, and to bring forward proposals in that regard.

Shirley Clerkin, Heritage Officer, was invited by the expert group to present an overview of what it is like working at the ground level to prevent biodiversity losses. At their September meeting, she focused on the common habitat of hedgerows, demonstrating the shifting baseline where the public don't notice gradual declines in landscape quality as we all become attuned to such changes; and on wetlands and peatlands where climate and biodiversity intersections are becoming very apparent to policy makers.

For many years Monaghan County Council has conducted surveys for many years on these habitat types, excellent information exists on their condition and extent in our county. RTE news featured a contribution from Shirley in an interview with George Lee following the day's proceedings.

Conservation works commence at Errigal Truagh Medieval Church ruin

Errigal Truagh comprises a complex of ecclesiastical archaeological remains in the townland of Mullanacross (Mullach na Croise – Summit of the crosses), ruins of the medieval church of St. Maudain, a graveyard with a collection of later historic 18th century headstones and monuments, and holy well. The site is elevated above the low road and one theory is that the ridge onsite may mark the processional route to the Holy Well, retained while nearby quarries were in operation.

The above-ground church ruins comprise of west gable with central doorway with a rounded arch; and an east wall with a lozenge shaped window profile consistent with 15th century tracery detail.

Both gable walls are at risk of collapse due to dissolution of mortar, loss of some stone and water migration through wall tops. Increased frequency of wind-driven rain, and projections for climate change due with activity increasing puts this structure further at risk. To increase its resilience, the church needs repair and conservation works before these impacts cause partial or full collapse of walls.

Following a research and preparation phase establishing the values of this site, and to develop methodologies and specifications for repair, the Heritage Office was awarded over €80,000 by the Community Monuments Fund towards the works on the west gable in 2022. These works have commenced and the conservation team is onsite, raking out joints, repointing with lime mortars, flaunching the walls tops, and carefully recording the works.



New film on wetlands and climate for young people

The Heritage Office has been working with a production company to make a short film on how peatlands and wetlands contribute to climate mitigation and adaptation. Starring John Sharpson, well-known children's presenter from RTE and TG4, filming was conducted on Sliabh Beagh and on a green screen in August and September. Currently with an editor, we expect to have this entertaining, informative and motivational film ready for January to be released to schools all over the county and beyond. The film is funded through the Creative Ireland fund.



Rossmore Mausoleum is home to seven species of bats

The Rossmore Mausoleum was designed by E.J. Tarver by commission of the fifth Baron Rossmore. It commemorates the death of the fourth baron who died after a hunting accident at Windsor Castle in 1874, aged 23. The location of the building beside lots of suitable habitats for bat roosting and feeding – trees, woodlands, rivers and lakes and its actual design with ventilation gaps and an attractive dome make it perfect for these wonderful little mammals.

A bat survey was conducted in order that we could put in place mitigation measures to allow for conservation works to be undertaken to the mausoleum, and to apply for a Bat Derogation Licence from the National Parks and Wildlife.

At least 12 brown long-eared bats were recorded roosting behind the tongue-and-groove timbers on the ceiling. This is a maternity roost where mothers and aunts help raise the young bats. These bats have distinctive large ears, almost as long as their body. Rossmore is an ideal habitat for them as they prefer foraging for insects and moths among woodland foliage. They love roosting in places with large attic spaces such as churches.

The tower dome seems to offer roosting and over-wintering hibernation places for the Daubenton's bat. These bats love flying over water where they hunt at twilight for midges, flies, mayflies and moths. Lots of opportunities exist for them in the park. Other species recorded at the mausoleum are common and soprano pipistrelles, leisler's bars, natterer's bats, and whiskered bats.

Conservation works, with mitigation measures to protect the bat species are underway onsite funded by the Historic Structures Fund and Monaghan County Council.





Heritage Council and Local Authority Heritage Officers visit Monaghan

In October, Heritage Officers from around the country visited Monaghan to discuss climate change and heritage.

Presentations included an eye-opener from The Discovery Programme on impacts of climate on archaeological monuments, conservation of peatlands from the Monaghan County Council CANN project, and County Monaghan Heritage Office on our Wetlands Action Plan. Visits to Sliabh Beagh to look at impacts of fire on the blanket bog habitats and to Errigal Truagh to discuss the stone conservation works to protect this ruin from impacts of driving rain added to the learning experience. An early morning tour of Castle Leslie Estate with the imitable Sammy Leslie, board member of the Heritage Council showing the complicated decision making processes involved in the conservation of the natural and cultural heritage of the estate reminded us all of the crucial role that is played by our heritage custodians.

To mark European Week of Sport and EU Mobility Week, the Active Travel Unit and Sporks Partnership in partnership with our Wellness Committee planned some lunch time staff events from 26th – 30th September. These lunch n learn events were a huge success. Staff from Planning, the Glen and MTEK offices participated in walking and cycling sessions.

With the newly upgraded Greenway and our stock of staff e-bikes, it was the ideal opportunity for staff to try out an e-bike. This session was facilitated by Drumlin Bike Trails, who supplied additional bikes in each location to allow a group of staff complete the session together. It started with a yard-based session first so everyone felt comfortable before taking to the Greenway for a 20-minute cycle.

The lunchtime walk saw staff from each location meeting at a mid-way point on the Greenway. Here they enjoyed some light body refreshing exercises & stretches led by local facilitator Cheryl Connolly before heading back to their offices for light refreshments.

Public consultation portal for Cycle Connects

The public consultation portal for Cycle Connects: Ireland's Cycle Network took place in October/November this year. CycleConnects: Ireland's Cycle Network aims to improve sustainable travel by providing the potential for more trips on a safe, accessible and convenient cycling network, connecting more people to more places. Proposals for cycling links in key cities, towns and villages in each county are included in the plan, in addition to connections between the larger towns, villages and settlements. The plan will also incorporate existing and planned cycle routes such as greenways and blueways. Together these plans will create an overall comprehensive cycle network for Ireland

HOUSING CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE



Housing For All proposed Delivery & Targets 2022-2026

Works have ongoing or finished on the following developments:

Ciones Renewal Scheme

Monaghan County Council received Funding Approval in 2019 from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage under the Rebuilding Ireland programme to demolish 11 properties on Fermanagh Street and Analore Street, Clones and construct 22 new apartments and 2 new Townhouses in their place.

- •The all-in project budget is circa €6million, 16 properties have already been delivered and occupied. The remaining 6 properties will be delivered in 2022.
- •The scheme has been a focus of attention nationally winning Excellence in Planning Award at the Property Industry Excellence Awards 2019



Ard an Radhairc, Carrickmacross

- •The project consists of the provision of 41 houses at Ard an Radhairc, Carrickmacross by Greenbriar Homes Limited.
- The development comprises of the four 2-Bedroom Mid terraced Houses, 37 three-Bedroom Semi-Detached/Terraced Houses including open space, landscaping, new access roads, drainage, street lighting and siteworks.
- Works commenced in November 2020, with phase handover of 6 houses in 2021, proposed 28 houses in September and the remaining 7 houses in December 2022.



Luí Na Greíne Housing Development Scotstown

Monaghan County Council's Housing Section along with Wynne, Gormley and Gilsenan Architects, Lead Designer and E.R. and Lowry Construction Ltd, Main Contractor are reviving this derelict/unfinished housing estate in the heart of Scotstown.

The total project budget is just below €7million and includes the completion of 4 derelict unfinished houses and the construction of a further 28 new houses, all built to the highest standard with a Building Energy Rating of A3 and above. The project is being handed over in five Phases. 19 houses have already been occupied and the remaining 13 houses will be completed in December 2022.



Coill Darach, Castleblayney



- The project consists of the provision of 30 houses at Coill Darach, Castleblayney by Geda Construction Ltd.
- The development comprises of five 2-Bedroom Houses & 25no 3-Bedroom Houses including open space, landscaping, new access roads, drainage, street lighting and siteworks.
- Works commenced in January 2022, with a phased delivery of 13 houses in 2022 and 17 houses in 2023.

MODERNISATION OF THE ELECTORAL REGISTRATION

Electoral Reform Act 2022, first significant programme of reform in 40 years, brings about much-needed major modernisation of the electoral system, making voter registration easier and more accessible while strengthening the integrity of the process. Rather than a statutorily imposed, paper-based annual cycle of the Draft and Live Registers, the new system will be much more responsive, flexible and streamlined.

Part 3, Franchise and Registration of Electors, which was commenced on 13th October 2022, sets out a brand-new way of managing the Register of electors.

The new process is more convenient for electors as they can register or update their details at any time – online and on paper form. With improved accessibility, voters are expected to take responsibility for updating and maintaining their own registration and ensure they are registered correctly – this will provide clarity for individuals on how they get on the register and give them greater control of their data.

The Act also provides for the future designation of a single registration authority to manage a shared database for all local authorities to use in their registration duties which will ultimately allow for management of duplications across the country.

Before the migration onto the shared database takes place (possibly as soon as 2024/2025), local authorities have been tasked with a major scale database maintenance and cleansing project in order to achieve highest possible accuracy of the Register.

To support local authorities in seeking engagement of electors, both new and existing, to check and complete their information with PPSN, eircodes and DOB's, a large scale national campaign will start in November.






Roads & Transport



Monaghan County Council, in association with Louth County Council, and in partnership with Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) are currently developing a road scheme to upgrade the existing N2 between Ardee and Castleblayney. Monaghan County Council appointed Jacobs Consulting Engineers (Jacobs) in 2018 to advance the project through the planning and design process. This is an important project to enhance key North/South and regional connectivity and to improve road safety, and the project is being developed in accordance with TII's Project Management Guidelines.





By Summer 2022 the N2 Project Team had substantially completed the necessary surveys/investigations to prepare an 'Initial Design' of the proposed road. In September, the project team contacted approximately 300 directly affected landowners, inviting them to meet with members of the project team to discuss the potential impact of the scheme on their lands. The meetings took place in the Shirley Arms Hotel, Carrickmacross. At times up to 4 separate landowner meetings ran concurrently, and over 220 meetings took place over a 5 week period. At the landowner meetings, members of the project team provided each landowner with an overview of the project, providing information on the projected timeframe for completion, while also explaining the design and impacts in the vicinity of the landowners holding, and providing landowners with drawings of the proposed road alignment past their property and potential landtake.

The project team wishes to sincerely thank all landowners who attended meetings for their engagement – in many cases landowners received the information that they may be significantly impacted by the proposed scheme, and it was a difficult time for many people.

After directly affected landowners were given the opportunity to meet with the project team, the initial road design was made available to the public on the project website www.N2MonaghanLouth.ie. It shows the route of the proposed N2, the locations of the proposed interchanges and junctions onto the N2, and the route of proposed sideroads and access roads along the N2. The design shown will be based on a preliminary, initial design, and will be subject to change following feedback from stakeholders.

Making the initial design of the road available is providing the wider community the opportunity to view the impacts of the project on the local road network and to view the alternative routes they will be required to travel to access local facilities and to join the improved N2. The answers to Frequently Asked Questions are also available on the project website.

Over the coming months the N2 Project Team will consider feedback received from landowners and other stakeholders before a design is finalised. An Environmental Impact Assessment Report and CPO documentation will then be prepared. Subject to approval, would then be submitted to An Bord Pleanála as part of the planning approval process.

Roads & Transport



Monaghan County Council are continuing to develop the Reclaimed Asphalt Product and have teamed up with the TII & DOT to form a working group to help direct and inform current and future pilot schemes within the county. The Working group are hoping to develop a National standard for this type of construction in 2023. In 2022 Reclaimed Asphalt Trial was completed on 2KM of the R180 in Lough Egish with 4,500 tonnes of Asphalt Millings being recycled and brought back into productive use. Continuous monitoring and testing is being undertaken on a weekly basis to establish the pavement and mix performance.

Residential Zoned Land Tax

The Residential Zoned Land Tax (RZLT) was introduced in the Finance Act 2021. The process to identify land to which the tax applies is now underway and the tax will be payable from 2024. The objective of the tax is to activate land that is serviced and zoned for residential use or mixed use which includes residential use, in order to increase housing supply and to ensure regeneration of vacant and idle lands in urban locations.

Monaghan County Council has prepared a Draft Map of the lands considered to be in scope for the RZLT as of 1st October 2022. The Draft Map and explanatory information is available to view online at www.monaghan.ie/planning/rzlt/

Any interested individuals or parties may make submissions in respect of land on the Draft Map. Preparing for the Unexpected

This guide can help you prepare for emergencies such as severe weather, gorse fires, flooding or a flu epidemic. This is not about doing the job of the emergency services; it is about supporting you and your family by making sensible preparations now to be self sufficient during an emergency or evacuation

Think about how you would keep warm if your heating failed or if the electricity or water was cut off. Consider how you would secure your home.

If it is not safe to go out in an emergency, the advice is usually to:

GO IN (go indoors and close all windows and doors) STAY IN (stay indoors) TUNE IN (to local radio, TV or internet for information and advice)

If you have to leave your home, get out, stay out and take others with you. Think of two meeting places. One near home and one further away, in case you cannot get home or if you get separated.

Pick a friend or relative who lives out of the area who you will agree to call to say you are OK should you need to leave home. (Make sure this person knows).

Remember

- Get the flu vaccine
- Keep your phone charged Keep warm, eat well and avoid unnecessary travel
- Have enough prescription medicines to see you through
- Know how to turn off the electricity, gas and water in your home

Building Your Home: Things to know

There is a mistaken belief amongst the general population that Buildings or Works with Commencement Notices with Opt-Out Declarations (generally single dwellings), under S.I. No. 365 of 2015, submitted by the Owners/Builders/Designers do not need to show compliance with Building Regulations. It is important for the public to understand that S.I. No. 365 of 2015 does not remove the requirement for Competent Person(s) to design, inspect and construct the Building or Works, and it does not remove the requirement for competent person(s) to collate/review all supporting documentation e.g. DoPs, CE Certs and any other documents required to demonstrate compliance with the Building Regulations.

Monaghan Civil Defence members continue to play an important support role in supporting MCC staff transporting Ukrainian families, assisting the Irish Blood Transfusion Service at local clinics, providing important medical cover at many large sporting & community events throughout County Monaghan. Other activities included volunteers assisting at the Electric Picnic concert in Co. Laois. Since the start of 2022 there have been 131 events supported by Civil Defence members.

Volunteers attend upskilling training in CD College Roscrea and also in the new Civil Defence Headquarters Monaghan. Additions to the fleet include a new Ford Transit Van, Whaly 435R rescue boat and the installation of a UHF / VHF Radio mast at the CD HQ Monaghan.





As part of this, a condition audit of the collection has been undertaken. This has meant a meticulous examination of objects in storage, shelf by shelf and box by box. The audit has also provided the opportunity for us to create a photographic record of the thousands of objects in the museum's collection




Additions to Monaghan's War of Independence Exhibition

The museum's current exhibition was launched in February 2020, receiving hugely positive reviews throughout the national media. Record numbers of visitors viewed the exhibit until it was forced to close in March 2020 due to COVID-19. Since reopening after COVID-19 restrictions were lifted, the decision to continue with the exhibition was taken. This was to allow an opportunity for people who were unable to visit during lockdown to view this fascinating exhibition.

In February 2022 the exhibition was added to, marking the 100-year centenary of what is known as 'The Clones Affray'. During this incident the death of Matt Fitzpatrick occurred at Clones Railway Station just one month after the transfer of power from the British to the Provisional Government of the new Irish Free State.

The new display on the Clones Affray has drawn attention to this sometimes forgotten flashpoint in the early history of the Irish State and has itself garnered national coverage. The exhibit includes the rifle that reportedly killed Matt Fitzpatrick, as well as his Mauser handgun and a wooden crucifix display including the small metal crucifix he had in his pocket when he died. The museum is very grateful to Matt's nephew Mr Gerard Fitzpatrick for his assistance and loans of objects for this exhibit.

Rossmore Castle comes back to Monaghan!



Rossmore Castle, the seat of the Westenra family in Monaghan, the Barons Rossmore, was demolished in the mid 1970's as a public health hazard due to its state of decay. This once imposing and grand big house commanded views over the estate that is now Rossmore Park, which received over 400,000 visitors last year.

However, the building that was central to this remarkable landscape has been out of view for a generation. Now the public will once again be able to marvel at this beautiful piece of our architectural heritage through a new mural, which has just been completed on a wall of the Westenra Arms Hotel in Monaghan Town.

The mural, which is one of the largest in the country truly reflects the scale of the original building. It is also very fitting that the mural is on the wall of the hotel named after the Westenra family. This was made possible by kind permission of the owner and manager Frank McEneaney and the assistance of Monaghan Tidy Towns

The mural is part of a county wide project; Monaghan Murals, which is managed jointly by Monaghan County Museum and the Patrick Kavanagh Centre. The project is funded by Creative Ireland initiative through Creative Monaghan Murals have already been completed in Carrickmacross, Ballybay and Castleblayney and it is hoped to create more throughout the county in the coming years.



LEADER Heritage Cluster Projects

The Monaghan Tourism Unit recently delivered a number of LEADER funded elements for Rossmore Forest Park and the Black Pig's Dyke. These consisted of the design and installation of new signage and interpretation panels to highlight the historical, architectural and natural features of Rossmore Forest Park, and two newly completed Conservation Management Plans for both sites to assess the heritage significance of each and identify a series of measures by which this can be better conserved, protected and interpreted. The completed Appraisal report is due in January 2023 and will determine next steps in the feasibility study process.
